

Curry County Scout Camp Will Open On Rogue River, Sunday; Will Advance In Ratings

Curry County's first Boy Scout summer camp will open next Sunday at a point some ten miles up the Rogue River from Gold Beach, on Lloyds Corporation property, on Lobster Creek. Some 100 Scouts are expected to be present, together with adult leaders from each of the troops: Brookings, No. 32; Gold Beach, No. 97; Port Orford, No. 98. Dave Putnam, regional director, will be in charge.

Each troop must have a minimum of one adult in camp at all times. Each troop will be expected to bring tents, cooking equipment, and food to supply the camp for a week.

The scout will provide him with ground cloth, sleeping bag, blankets, extra clothing, a toilet articles, swim suit, utensils, and such other items he may think necessary for comfort.

Other useful equipment, such as hatchet, scout hand-saw, flashlights, compass are provided by each troop for use during the camp.

Firearms will not be permitted in the camp. Guns or other weapons are prohibited.

Individual programs are to be planned by each troop. Assistance in instruction in the following subjects will be available: swimming, life-saving, camp-craft, pioneering, first aid.

Supper on Sunday, July 23, will be a special board meeting for five members of the troop who are applicants for Eagle rank.

Following the board all troops are invited to take part in a general campfire program. Following the campfire, adult leaders will hold a conference to co-ordinate the camp for the three troops throughout the week.

The troops will meet at the court house, Gold Beach, at 3:00 p. m. Sunday, from where transportation will be provided to the camp.

The county council has been trying to make arrangements to have a river boat for some afternoon when an excursion will be planned up the Rogue to some point.

Friday evening a court of honor will be held at camp, when boys of all troops will be passed to higher ranks, if the same are completed. Parents are especially urged to be present at this time. Cars may reach the camp by driving to Rogue park, a few miles north of Gold Beach on Hy. 101, turn right up the river some six or more miles, and follow the road sign to camp.

Chill the pineapple juice, wine and sparkling water. Combine in a water pitcher or punch bowl. Add the lemon juice, and sugar to taste. Garnish with lemon slices. Fill glasses 3/4 full. Serves 8 to 12.
