

Oregon Coast Association Set Nov. 7-9 As Dates For 1948 Annual Convention

TILLAMOOK—Dates of the annual convention of the Oregon Coast Association, to be held at Newport, have been set for Nov. 7, 8, and 9, after suggestion of these dates at a meeting of the budget committee of the association at the Tioga hotel, Coos Bay, July 8. Official appointments of Claude G. Stotts as vice-president of the association for Coos County; of J. E. Norton, of Coquille, to chairman of the budget committee, and Robert Thompson of Coquille as a member of the budget committee, by Chas. A. Ross, president of the association, were announced following this meeting of the budget committee at which time they were recommended for appointment.

The budget committee approved the semi-annual statements of receipts and expenditures of the Oregon Coast Association for January 1, through June 30, 1948, as presented by the manager, Verne H. Tinnerstet, and authorized the printing of more Oregon Coast folders.

Manager Verne Tinnerstet reported that the Oregon Coast Association is at the present time running a series of ads, "Keep Cool on the Oregon Coast," in the Bakersfield Californian, Fresno Bee, Sacramento Bee and San Diego Tribune-Sun Union newspapers in California, which are bringing numerous inquiries each day.

Tinnerstet reported on a recent trip into California, south to Garberville, in the interests of Oregon Coast association, to investigate road conditions and rumors, and to distribute folders. Road conditions in Southern Oregon and northern California were found to be greatly improved. Chambers of commerce, service station operators, travel agencies and individuals expressed us in giving correct information and Oregon coast literature to the traveling public.

Few Girls Show Interest In Meeting Set For Last Friday

Girls, who recently showed an interest in forming a Girl Scout troop here, were given an opportunity, last Friday afternoon to report and sign up, since all information had come to the committee. Only a few, less than a half dozen came.

A beach party, at which time girls could enjoy a lunch and a swim, was planned by the committee in hopes to get the girl scout movement launched locally, but failed dismally.

Personal solicitation will be attempted by committee members and leaders, and if this, too, fails, the committee may forget the matter, it was reported to the Pilot.

Sponsored by the V. F. W. Auxiliary, which has put in considerable effort, the movement was pushed with plenty effort. Since there is no council in Oregon, except in larger cities, small town distant from these places must function as lone troops.

Data concerning formation of this type of troop was awaited, and was perhaps reason for the apparent loss of interest.

Crescent City Blues won by an 8-6 score Saturday evening. Local hurlers, Swearingen and Valentine, allowed the Blue but two earned runs, but seven local errors did the damage. Swede Benson led the Blue Sox attack with three hits, one a triple, followed by Neil Nelson with a single and double, and Swearingen with two singles.

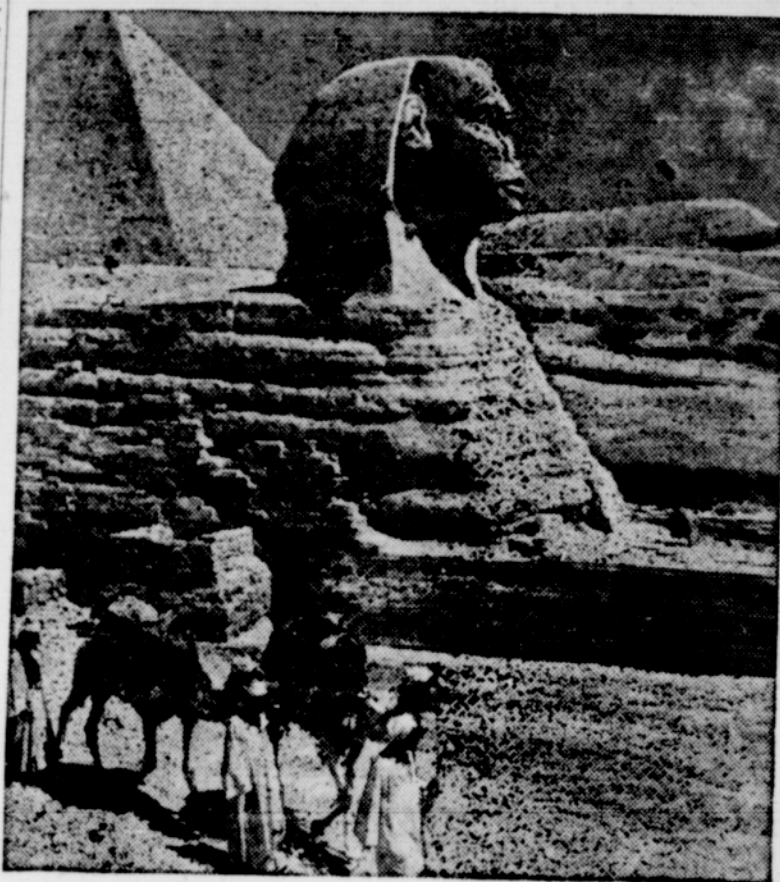
The Sunday game, played before a large "after the parade" crowd, was a thriller. Rogue River Merchants, top team in the Southern Oregon league, with seven wins and no defeats, barely nosed out Brookings by a 6-5 score. The Rogues were ahead 6 to 3 as the Blue Sox came to bat in the ninth.

Spangler walked with one down and then Chuck Griffith poked a long home run into the open spaces of right field. Vern Hanscam singled to put the tying run on base, and advanced to second on Maris' infield out. Jack Moon then hit a hard smash to Rogue's third baseman, who made a fine stop and throw to catch Moon at first by a step and the game.

Leading local hitters were Leo Spangler with two doubles, Griffith with a single and home run and Hanscam with single and double. Paul Maris was badly spiked early in the game, and had to leave the mound, going to first base, but later showed more courage by returning to mound to stop Rogue River scoring.
