Are you thought about our fair? It's just a month away! Tom Ayers of Gold Beach has been appointed manager and from the way he started, I believe you can expect a most successful fair year. There is a lot of work to be done on a fair, so, all of us are willing to get in and help. The dates—Sept. 3, 4 and 5. Premium books will be off the shelves this week. Before servicing: To make the most of canned citrus juice, like that of any fresh juice, housewives have learned the simple device of pouring the juice back and forth from one glass to another before serving. This puts back into the juice the vacuum which was removed during the vacuum canning. Labels on some cans of citrus juice now suggest this.

Scientists of the U. S. department of agriculture caution adding air this way should be done in advance, but just before serving and well chilled dishes. Otherwise the added air will have to affect the C in the juice oxidation and this destroys one of the important nutritive elements and its fine flavor as well. Oxidation goes slower in cold and also because cold absorbs air more readily. Scientists advise always having the juice chilled before pouring back and forth.

It is removed from citrus in commercial canning so the juice stands in the vitamin C value and will not be damaged by oxidation.
