Three livestock clubs of Curry county will have judging teams on this tour and crop and weed control will also be

studied by club members.

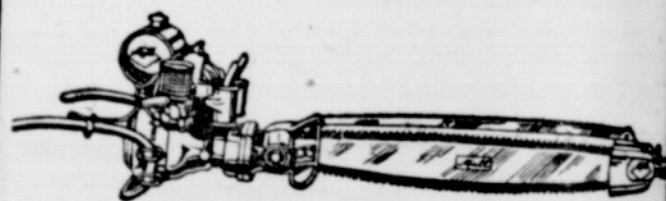
