

MR. AND MRS. FRED GUSTAFSON FLY FROM SWEDEN FOLLOWING "VISIT"

Making Trip By Air Saved Over Month's Time Couple Claims In Describing Two-Months Trip

Swedish Sweden last Wednesday, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gustafson returned at their Harbor home Saturday, a saving of about three months had they taken the conventional boat and train trip from the point. On the trip, both way, they claim they saved over a month of time in making a trip to their old home. They were gone for two months, and all but practically a week was spent visiting.

They flew to Sweden in 33 hours from Oakland," said Gustafson, and "coming home we were turned back 20 minutes in Iceland, to Scotland, and made it in about 40 hours."

They would have taken three months to make this trip by boat and train, and adding the return trip, we would have had almost six weeks more on the trip to have gotten in the amount of visiting."

Mr. Gustafson had been 39 years since Mr. Gustafson had visited his boyhood home of Ludvika, but Mrs. Gustafson had visited in 1938. Gustafson was able to visit his three brothers and three sisters while Mrs. Gustafson saw only remaining sister.

They saw many of our youth

friends, although many have died or moved away. We ate, drank coffee and visited until we were actually worn out," Fred smiled as he recalled many visits.

"Sweden came through the war in much better shape than one can imagine. Many children of Norway and Finland were cared for, and are still being cared for."

"While Sweden sold iron ore to Germany for coal, it was by and through efforts of Sweden that the Allies were able to eventually win."

"We went to Chicago by the United Airlines," Mr. Gustafson said in answer to questions about the trip, "From Chicago we flew by American Airlines, landing at Newfoundland, Ireland, Copenhagen, and Stockholm."

"Coming home, we were 23 minutes out of Iceland, when fog forced us back to Scotland for the night, last Wednesday. We made but little time that day. We left Scotland at 9 a. Thursday, and landed at New York City about 11 that evening. We left New York at 1 p. m. Friday and landed in San Francisco at 11 p. m. The next morning we flew to Eureka, where they were met by Eric and Lois Ask."

"While our air tickets totaled something over \$2000, we figure that it was cheaper than had we gone by train and ship. We then saved so much time which we used to visit. It is a great experience for any one."
