What is Steam Jacket Cooking?

A new type of cooking equipment using steam has just found its way to the market. It is a steam jacket cooker for home use. Steam jacket cooking has been used for some time in industry and in cafeterias where large quantities of food are prepared. Now the idea is working its way into home equipment. Let's see what it looks like.

The cooker is made of two sections that fit together something like a double boiler. Water is placed in the outer section. The inner container fits inside and is clamped with a sealing band. A rubber gasket seals the steam inside. As the water is heated, steam forms and pressure is built up. This causes high temperature heat which is uniform all the way around the inner container. An adjustable control valve keeps the pressure constant. The food within the cooker is surrounded by heat and may be tasted and tested at any time while it is cooking.

What are the advantages? All foods may be cooked in little water since there is no burning or scorching. However, if cooked with too little water they can still stick. This cooker is best.
