I WRITE as I See It!

We hear from time to time pointed remarks concerning public morals. Recently an eminent statesman remarked that a certain political convention violated the public code of morals. This brings us to face the question: Is there in this country a code of public morals that does not apply to individual conduct? Can a group or mass assembly of individuals, brought together legally or otherwise, perform acts that pass without moral rebuke, which, if done by a single individual would be termed decidedly immoral and would demand prosecution under the laws of the land? Repeatedly we witness deep moral crimes that are not rebuked because of their public nature, which if committed by an individual would incur severe penalties.

The definitions we humans have ascribed to morality are many and variable. We would bankrupt the dictionary in our attempts to define morality in a manner that will not conflict with or condemn our individual tastes, desires and indulgences. We see this exemplified in our broadened view of world horizons. We decry, and we believe justly, the Russian standards of morals. Russia loudly proclaims that we have dredged our moral code from the lowest depths of infamy. This would spur every individual to a thorough examination of his own conception of and state of morals. In the aggregate, society is a collection of individuals that compose its whole complex mass. Without individuals there could be no mass aggregations of peoples. It is the individual leaven that leavens the whole lump.

If we are genuinely interested in establishing a clean and a healthy moral atmosphere throughout the world we will become intensely and thoroughly interested in washing our individual two hands and our hearts also of moral guilt and uncleanness.

There can be no immoral communities wherein the individuals composing them are morally clean. "Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things. But are we sure that the judgment of God is according to truth against them which commit such things. And thinkest thou this O man, that judgest them which do such things, and doest

the same, that thou shalt escape the judgment of God? Or despisest thou the riches of his goodness and forbearance and long suffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance." Romans 2:1-4.
