CRESCENT CITY — Jackie King, the celebrated trampoline artist, who will perform at the Del Norte County Fair, to be held here, Aug. 20 to 22, including one of the cleverest and most versatile acts in the nation. Bob McClure, of the fair, has a real trampoline novelty as well as one of the most interesting acts this season. Jackie King is a trampoline artist of rare ability and a comedian along with it. He puts the crowds in a panic of laughter as he stages "volunteer trampoline."

The past week has about 100 entries, says McClure, as he grew enthusiastic in the interest being manifested in the fair this year, not only by local people but from all sections of the state. To date, 100 swine, of most every breed, have been entered. The Shorthorn beef type cattle shown at the fair have been selected by Mr. and Mrs. Stein and Carl Gislser.

The floricultural building will be filled with flowers, bulbs and thousands of them. To quench the thirst for the flower enthusiast, the floricultural booths shown by the St. Pauls Lions club, 20-30 club and Grace Baker of Fort Dick, to enhance the beauty of the beautiful, the new floricultural building is to be colorfully lit for the night showing.

Exhibit buildings are to remain open until 9:30 each night. Among the sport activities several teams have been entered in wild horse wagon races, this assuming the proportions of a battle royal, similar to the races of old. Some of the riders in the west will be competing for the saddle horse races. Bob McClure, secretary-manager of the fair, states that the string of the fairgrounds hangs on the outside this year. That there will be no charge and that park-

ing will be free on a dust-free lot. Everyone from this section is invited to enjoy the hospitality of Crescent City during the three-day program. That you don't have to bother about a lunch as there will be lots to eat on the fairgrounds at popular prices. There will be good music, drills and entertainment by the popular Crescent City Legion drum corps, led by Drum Major Carl Leete and the resplendent 50-piece Gold Beach band and nattily uniformed, high-stepping majorettes with Sibley R. Mateer, band-leader.
