Averill Jr., 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Averill J. Zook, who was flown from Crescent City to Portland about two weeks ago in an effort to save his life, died at Portland last Wednesday, word came late last week.

Suffering from the dread lukemia, a cancerous condition of the blood stream, he was taken ill only about three weeks ago. He was first taken to the Crescent City hospital, where little could be done.

With the family still away following the tragedy, little information is available concerning the case. The Zooks came here last spring. He is employed in the lumbering industry.
