Mr. Lopez was born at Crescent City in 1852, and spent most of his life at Smith River where he followed the fishing trade for many years. Among the scenes of interest were some taken at Dawson, at Whitehorse, of Robert W. Service's cabin, which still remains intact to allure tourists, of the salmon running the Yukon, and of the railroad trip to Skagway.

As each scene appeared, Mr. Milford made it all the more interesting by adding some memory of an experience. He told of how he had to pay Eskimo to pose for pictures at their huts.

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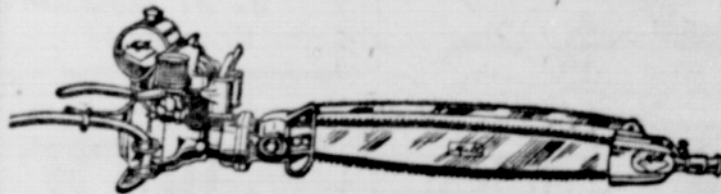
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
