A wire-recording of the speech made by Don Cate, a Paul Harris fellowship student, was heard during the time the club was eating lunch. This young man is one of 20 chosen from the United States to study in a foreign nation at expense of Rotary International next year.

Representing Dist. 102, Rotary International, Don Cate's graduate of Pacific University, Forest Grove, and has had experience on newspapers of Oregon. He will study philosophy at the University of Berne, Switzerland, leaving the United States on the "New Amsterdam," Sept. 3.

Following his year of study, he hopes to be employed as a foreign correspondent for some international news service.

Hans Culmback, of Everett, Wash., Rotary Club, told of his club and its activities. His club, he told the meeting, had just purchased a camp for the Boy Scouts of that area. This camp included a 30-acre lake and is being developed as a year-around camp. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Smith.

Rev. Noble Crawford, evangelist, who holds a series of meetings at the Baptist Community church, told the club of his work in the evangelistic field, and why he had chosen that work. He also explained the Charles Fuller Foundation and its work in the

religious field. Other Rotary luncheon visitors included Joe Milne of St. George, Utah and George Runyan of San Fernando, Calif. Club.

Dr. Stevenson began the series of 5-minute talks on Rotary Magazine, a new feature being inaugurated by the local club. He spoke briefly on the change of life expectancy in the United States in the past 100 years, and gave a summary of reasons for this raise of years.

lunches that build and maintain strong bodies. A 4-point pattern is suggested for the carried lunch—including some food from each of the four classes in each lunch will help keep American youth strong. These four points are:

1. One cup milk in some form
2. A vegetable or fruit, or both;
3. Whole grain or enriched bread;
4. A food rich in protein (as eggs, fish, cheese, meat, beans, or peanut butter).
