'Tolerance' Declared Big Challenge

The modern-day challenge that Rotarians, as members of a world-wide service organization, must accept with action in terms of good will and understanding is "Live together in constructive thinking and tolerance—or die."

That was the message of William Carl Schuppel, Portland, Oregon, governor of District 102 of Rotary International, in addressing the Brookings Rotary Club, Tuesday, on his official visit. He addressed a luncheon meeting of the club, following a round-table discussion, Monday evening.

Rotary, with one of its principal objectives "to encourage and foster international understanding through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the ideal of service," has a wide influence far greater than its numerical strength, Mr. Schuppel emphasized to the club.

"Devoted to service, Rotary provides a common ground for the men of the world, regardless of creed, color or government under which they live, to promote and nurture understanding," the district governor continued, in his talk.

As a result of Paul Harris Memorial fund and Rotary Foundation, young men and women who show promise of being tomorrow's leaders, are being sent to other countries at the expense of Rotary International. Likewise young men and women in foreign lands are being brought to the United States in order that they may become acquainted with the manners and customs of the of the people of this country. This is one of the ways in which Rotary is attempting to contribute to international good will. Mr. Schuppel also that Don Cate, of Forest Grove, has left for Europe where he will attend the University of Bern, Switzerland.

I WRITE as I See It!

In his recent book, "Of Flight and Life," Charles A. Lindberg, in forthright statements, declares his views on world problems. The book is timely and wherever read will stimulate thought and discussion.

If Mr. Lindberg understood the principles of Christianity as thoroughly as he understands the principles of aeronautics I am confident he would hold a different view on the relationship between Christianity and

world security. In common with the opinion of a large number of the world's religious thinkers, Mr. Lindberg believes one of the greatest steps we can take toward quieting the universal unrest and fear, is to select the best of all the religious philosophies of the entire world, including Christianity, fuse them into one great whole and present them to mankind for a universal platform for religion.

If the gospel of Jesus Christ (and without this gospel Christianity would be meaningless), was an invention of man, or in any manne a product of human philosophy, its fusion with the

almost countless variable religious philosophies of the world might be possible. Fortunately for mankind this is not the situation. The Scriptures is the real source of all knowledge we possess regarding the origin of Christianity. The writers of both the Old and New Testaments state again and again that the truths of which they wrote did not originate from within their own hearts, but were the products of Divine Revelation, proceeding direct from God, through the mediation of his Son, Jesus Christ. This is always and forever New Testament teaching and is fully supported by the Old Testament system of sacrifices and offerings. Any professedly Christian Religion that believes and teaches otherwise than this is a misnomer. Christianity in its essence is Jesus Christ, and Jesus Christ is more than a human savior.

All philosophies of religion I know anything about other than Christianity hold that man has within himself that spark of Divine Power that enables him to accomplish his own transformation from a man into a demigod, that Christ is no more than a man of noble moral principles and ideals comparable to Buddha and other religious philosophers. Even Christianity has been contaminated with this false theory to an alarming extent and this philosophy is being taught from many pulpits. Christianity is possible only because of the faith of Jesus Christ, and in order to possess it man must have faith in the power of Christ to forgive sin. For these reasons no human theory of religion can be produced that will measure up to the Divine Specification.

The multitudinous religious cults of the world will exert great effort by means of compromise and consolidation to bring about a union of all religious professions. Through this world-wide effort the Gospel of Christ and true Christianity will stand untainted, unbowed and uncompromising in its purpose and purity. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved. Acts 4:12.
