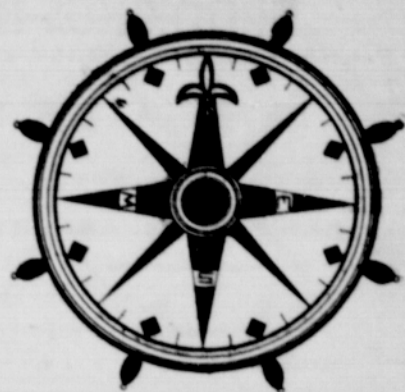

The handbook, to be distrib- uted to donors of funds, tells of the work, especially of needy and dependent children, who will be cared for by these funds from all counties.

In child care, the fund is di- vided in this manner, according to chest committees: The Chest subscribes 42% necessary. The remainder comes from donations of relatives, where possible, and from county tax funds. It is evi- dent, then that most of the child support must come from chest moneys.

Estimated as the need for this state next year will be \$500,000. Curry county must raise \$730 of this amount.

## CUBS AND BOY SCOUT PROGRAM IS FULL OF ACTIVITIES FOR NEXT YEAR

### County Will Be Given Opportunity To Watch Scoutcraft Training Through Competition

At a county council meeting of Curry District, Boy Scouts of America, held at Gold Beach last Wednesday night, a full year of scouting has been planned for the boys of the county. Boys of every section of the county will participate in this program, if all plans go through as planned.

The Cubs will be given an opportunity to "strut" their stuff at a Cuborama (comparable to a scout camporee) sometime in early June. Cubs packs over the county will be planning for this event in every action during the coming winter months.

During Scout Week, February 6 to 12—at Gold Beach will be seen the first Curry county Scout circus. All troops will participate, and each troop will be ex-

pected to put on several stunts to show the public a general all-around idea of the training derived from Scouting.

Started last year when the county camporee was held at Westmore Camp, up the Winchuck, next year the second is to be held somewhere along the beach, north of Gold Beach, to be closer to most troops.

The popular spot on the Rogue River again will be used for the summer camp in 1949. All troop leaders agreed that figured none better could be found, so accessible to all troops.

Courts of honor will be held whenever necessary, but three or four district courts will be on the calendar the coming year. Arrangements will be made from time to time to bring all troops together thus adding importance to each court of honor.

New district officers will be chosen at the district meeting, tentatively set for early in December. R. G. Sabin heads the group this year.

Better to help all boys of the scout movement in the county, Dave Putnam, regional scout executive, has planned a leaders training court, to be held at Gold Beach November 6 and 7, which will be over a week-end when scouters will be expected to actually live scoutcraft as the boys will be trained. The fair grounds will be used for this course.

Cub leaders will be expected to attend a district meeting every two months. This includes den mothers, who will come for the dinner meeting, and who will air their problems for solution.

Recognizes Scouting Program.

In its recommendations to the local school board, Oregon department of education emphasized the value of the scout program in the development of its schools. Along with it in importance was placed the 4-H program which was inaugurated in this area last spring, with gratifying results.

Parents of boys, between ages of 9 and 12 are urged to enroll their sons in Cubbing. Boys over 12 are wanted in the Boy Scout troop, now newly re-organized, with plenty of experienced boys to aid all the youth who enroll.

## Waters Reported Have Petitioned Bankruptcy Court

Walter G. Oehler, United States trustee in bankruptcy, of Corvallis, stated yesterday that he received notice that a petition in bankruptcy has been filed, about to be filed, by Fleming Waters and Louise V. Waters, of the United States district court at Portland.

Waters, during the past year, been made the defendant in various actions in circuit court. Among these actions, the one of P. J. Lesmeister against Waters for unpaid insurance premiums that Lesmeister alleges are due him from Waters. Lesmeister is being represented in circuit court by Ed F. Ackley local attorney.

When asked as to the effect of Waters bankruptcy upon all pending litigation, Ackley said, "I shall not be able to definitely state that Waters has filed a petition in bankruptcy until I've received official notice thereof, from Mr. Oehler, the referee. In bankruptcy a petition is filed and the referee sets a time and place for hearing. At this time all persons holding any claims against the bankrupt may appear and question the bankruptcy. At the same time priority claims may be considered by the referee. Before giving any opinion in this matter I shall have to await developments."

Monday morning furniture and personal effects of the Waters were loaded upon a truck which was owned and operated by a Tennessee trucking company. The negro driver of the truck, when asked where he was taking his load, stated that he was taking it to Texas. The news of this bankruptcy, if true, casts gloom over business circles of Brookings.
