Put in what you feel you can easily afford—a dollar, maybe a five or ten-spot. Half goes to the boys of this county who are coming up over that trail you want them to travel. The amount asked of this community should amount to about two or three dollars per family, if all will be good enough to give.

Have you received a copy of the Voters Pamphlet? Be sure to read everything in it, for it gives a clear picture about the measures you will be required to decide by your Nov. 2 ballot.

There are some catchy questions—that is, they are put in such a manner to fool the people in voting for or against them. Study with care what it says of each initiative measure to be put on the ballot. It might mean a great deal to the well-being of the state.

Study the power issue, the liquor by glass referendum, the fish traps. I'd like to suggest how I feel on some of these items but I cannot at this time. This is America—the people have a right to choose for themselves that kind of government they wish in the individual state.

Be not fooled, either by the claims made by a number of the candidates whose pictures and messages appear in this volume.
