1. There are 354 contributors (also members).
2. There is \$7,066.30 on hand and pledged. This money

3. Definite plans are being laid for building the hospital.
SITES: Choice of four beautiful sites are available,
one of which will be selected when the hospital is assured
ARCHITECT: An eminent Portland architect, Roi L.
Morin, is drawing preliminary sketches for the hos-
pital without charge to the association. Therefore no
money has had to be spent for valuable architectural
advice or for information regarding similar projects
elsewhere. Mr. Morin's generosity should be recognized
by the people of the county inasmuch as he has no
guarantee that he will be chosen to supervise this
project when building gets under way.
4. A proposed special tax levy has been included for the
November election. It's a small two-year levy and if
passed will provide one-half of the funds to be raised
in the county.
