

Bradley Page Tells Of Movie Making To Rotary Club

A story of a trip, on which he took his listeners through a motion picture studio, was told by Bradley Page, Tuesday noon at Rotary luncheon. In order, he told Rotarians, to get the best picture of the "moving making," we will go through Hollywood on a tour.

All movie companies have 25 to 30 different departments, all having a voice in the production and ultimate showing. These departments range from the make-up, all through the list, to the publicity. Each studio is staffed by a number of writers, who make adaptations of stories, perhaps one published in a national magazine, or a book, or an idea some author may have for a picture.

The writers department, said Mr. Page, add much to the cost of filming a picture.

In the "tour" Mr. Page took the Rotarians, he told of the function of each department, as much as he could with the limited time he had. Then he explained how the "cutting department," by its "sneak previews," finally arrived at the product to be sent out to the theatres.

In filming a picture, a schedule is made up in advance, but usually this time is exceeded by a number of months. Much time is often wasted in filming scenes, when action does not go according to the schedule.

Mr. Page, who went to Hollywood in 1931, after a time on the legitimate stage, told of the magnitude of the movie lots—how films were actually taken and of the cost in each step of filming.

Following his talk he answered question as long as time permitted.

District Escapes Fire Another Year

GOLD BEACH — With heavy fall rains continuing, the 1948 fire season is definitely over and the Chetco district of Siskiyou national forest has completed another successful year. During '48 the forest district had no fires whatsoever. During the past nine years the Chetco district experienced but ten fires, according to the records. Of these eight were caused by lightning, one by a burning home, and one by a Japanese bomb. Total acreage burned by all these fires was less than a half acre.

District Ranger John C. Porisch and his fire-fighting organization, extend to the people of Curry county and to visitors of the forest lands their appreciation of the accomplishment.

Few forest communities can boast of better record. It indicates that campers, ranches, loggers, tourists and all users of the national forest have been careful with fire in the woods. It means that thousands of acres of land are producing timber which is steadily increasing in value and importance to Curry county.

The entire Chetco district fire organization was disbanded on Sept. 18. This marks the last year of service for Wm. B. Lane, well-known Snow Camp lookout. Bill is retiring after working 25 seasons on the Chetco district.

Most of these years he was located at Snow Camp lookout. A farewell party in his honor was held at the district ranger's home at the close of the fire season.

The district personnel presented him with a handsome traveling bag as a parting gift. His dependable service gift of telling tall tales will be sorely missed in the seasons to come.

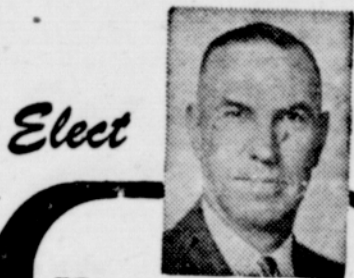
