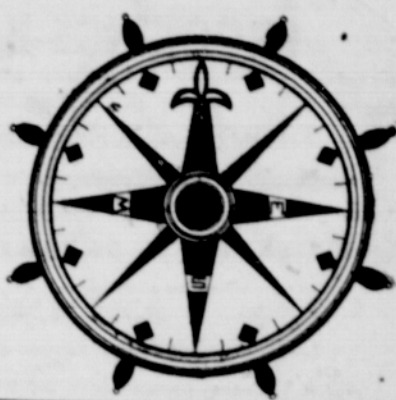

## Basement Being Arranged For 1st Grade 'Overflow'

School Board of District No. 17 and the trustees of Baptist Community church reached an agreement that the district may lease the church basement for use as a classroom for one-half of the mammoth first grade enrolled this year.  
The agreement made it necessary that the church board alter the room to meet specifications set forth by the state board of education. This work is being done in evenings at the hours carpenters are available.  
The ceiling is being covered with fir-tex, the walls are being-plastered, with windows repaired in cases where necessary.  
A coat of white paint will be added as soon as changes are complete.  
The board found itself faced with a 40-member first grade, nearly twice the number allowed by the state board in order to maintain a standard school and receive state aid.

## ELLSWORTH MET WITH CHAMBER MEMBERS, FRIDAY

### European Situation Is Serious As Has Been Told Though Papers

"The situation in Berlin with reference to the relations of all the Big Four nations is serious — just about as serious as it has been pictured by the newspapers of the county," Harris Ellsworth, congressman for the 4th District, told members of the local chamber of commerce at a luncheon, Friday noon. "We are facing crucial times."  
Mr. Ellsworth frankly answered all questions put to him by those present, concerning all the legislation enacted by 80th Congress, especially the Taft-Hartley act which has become quite a campaign issue. Both labor and management, he said, agree to its fair principles.  
The industrial east has recognized the possibilities of the far west. In all future legislation, he asserted, there will be more appropriations to aid development which will affect the economy of the nation.  
Accompanying Ellsworth to Curry county was Mr. Garver, his secretary.  
Mr. Ellsworth left here for Gold Beach where a dinner was set for that evening, with a boat trip up the Rogue planned for Saturday.
