

Hospital Committee Meeting To Adopt "Articles"

GOLD BEACH — Members of hospital committee adopted proposed articles of incorporation at a meeting Wednesday at the Episcopal church. Following were present: Mrs. Mateer, Mrs. Gladys Trivette, Mrs. Berniece Turner, Dr. Cartwright, R. M. Knorr, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas DeWitt, Mrs. Alberta Kessler, Cyndie, Mrs. Marion Bettis, Mrs. Koblenzar, Mrs. Viola Omlin, Mrs. Alvin Roberts.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Mateer who stated the purpose of the meeting, and that Mrs. Jean Stratton Orford, had called to represent although they would be represented at the meeting by the articles and have financial contributions to send to the bank.

The proposed articles of incorporation prepared by Mr. Good were read by R. M. Knox. After discussion and minor alterations, they were adopted by the group, which is now known

as the Curry County Hospital, Inc. Dr. Erickson and Dr. Cartwright then discussed the urgency of the hospital and means of getting the facts before the public. It was brought out that in these days of advanced medical knowledge, doctors must practice in places where they have access to the scientific equipment available only in a modern hospital. If Curry county fails to build its proposed hospital it will rob its doctors of these facilities and the doctors cannot afford to have their practice here—either from professional or financial standpoint.

It was further pointed out that a modern hospital attracts people to a community. The businessmen of the county gain many advantages from a hospital which would mean additional dollars in their pockets.

It was decided to use slides at theatres, newspaper ads, and a number of handbills for publicity. They also decided to make all possible use of personal contacts and group discussions at organization meetings.

It was a small group that met. Opinion was that they need much help to make the proposed hospital a reality—but a reality it must be or Curry county will take a backward step in her standard of living.

Realty Transfers

An urgent need which has been felt by this community for some time has finally been filled by the purchase this week by Elmer Parker of the Harry W. Axford property on the Chetco River.

Mr. Parker will operate this property as a sportsmen's resort and boat landing. He plans very extensive improvements to include a road to the water's edge, a large parking area and boat landing. He will provide proper housing for motors and gear, care and servicing of boats, complete facilities for dressing and storing of sportsmen's catch, as well as boats for rental and guide service. Plans are also being made for the installation of big flood lights on the boat landing and parking area.

Pete J. Lesmeister Agency, handling this transaction, is to be complimented on being instrumental in bringing this much-needed enterprise into this community.
