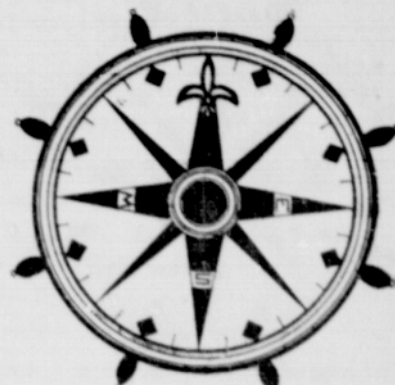

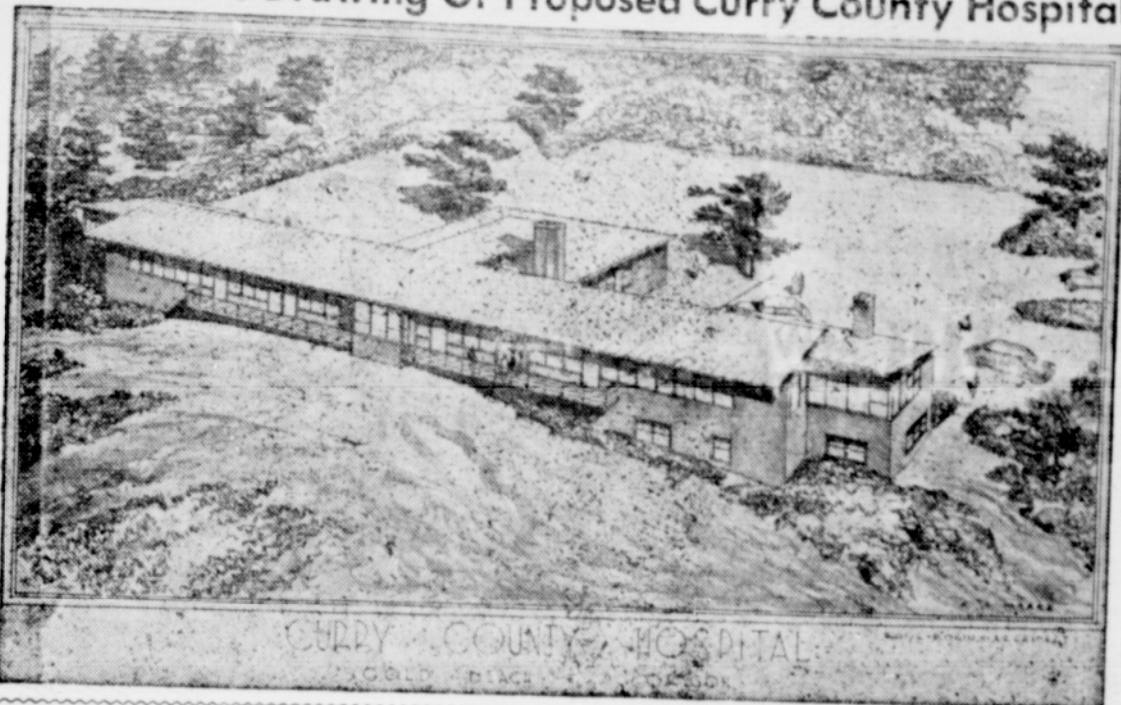

## Tax Levy For Area Set At 61.7 Mills

Summary of the assessment roll for 1948 for Curry county has just been received and shows a total school tax for Brookings, School Dist. No. 17, in the amount of 46.1 mills. This is a reduction in total millage of 1.4 mills from last year, and 12.3 mills from two years ago. The summary sheet shows a general county tax of 9.16 mills, and a county road tax of 3 mills.

Examination of the sheet shows further that the present valuation of School Dist. No. 17 is now \$1,217,670, compared to \$1,129,905 last year, and \$1,049,215 the year before last.

With this year's enrollment the largest in the history of Dist. No. 17, school officials are pleased with this year's record.

## FRED ADAMS IS ACTIVE AGAINST "POWER BILL"

### Author Of Power Bill Defeated In May Primaries For Act

Fred W. Adams, of Ophir, and candidate for joint legislator of Curry and Coos counties, while in town, Monday, was campaigning also for the defeat of the "Idaho Power Bill," which comes up for referendum vote next Tuesday.

"This measure was brought up at legislature at the last session by a man from Malheur county, and was defeated in both houses, but by some manner, was put on the ballot at this election.

"This power bill, purported to be for benefit of the residents of eastern Oregon, is not to their liking," Mr. Adams smiled, "for the people of that county soundly whipped the author in the primaries held in May."

"Morton Tompkins, state master of Grange, and against the measure, furnished all the daily newspapers with evidence of the futility of the bill, but they still came out for the measure.

"Proponents of the bill have managed to obtain signatures of many prominent people of the state to give their endorsements. This confuses the issue for the average voter."

An appeal from Curry Pomona Grange, asking for defeat of the bill, may be seen elsewhere in this issue.

## CRIMINAL CASE HEARD, FRIDAY, IN JUSTICE COURT

### Complaint Signed By R. E. Simmons; Peace Bonds On Clauson

A criminal complaint was filed in Justice of the Peace Sandbo's court last Friday, Oct. 22, by R. E. Simmons, against E. A. Clauson.

Simmons complained against Clauson, charging that Clauson destroyed property on Simmons' ranch, in Cape Farrello district. Simmons also asked the court to place Clauson under peace bonds. After hearing Simmons' complaint Judge Sandbo issued an order placing Clauson under a \$1000 peace bond.

In stating his side of the case Simmons said: "Last Thursday evening about nine, Clauson, and two other men, drove a truck up to my gate that leads onto my land along Cape Farrello road.

"Using the truck as a battering ram, they smashed down my gate. The next day I re-built my gate, this time placing it back 15 feet from the highway, and all on my land.

"I had hardly concluded rebuilding the gate when Clauson again used a truck and broke down this second gate that I built.

"Clauson then drove several truck loads of logs over my land and when I tried to stop him, he threatened me with physical attack."

Simmons said that he was putting the matter in the hands of the district attorney and was going to insist that the law give him protection.
