Ten young people take  
four die early in life,  
become addicts, and three  
die in spite of it.—*Dr. Mayo*.  
America last year, we spent  
\$1,000,000 for intoxicating  
drugs, more than double that  
was spent for education  
and religion. Perhaps this ac-  
counts, in large measure for the  
difficulty we are having to  
maintain and develop our educa-  
tional institutions.

The State of Washington spent  
\$47,125,000,000 for liquor  
and \$80,000,000 for education.  
The state supports two taverns  
every church and three tav-  
erns for every school. We do not  
know the figures for Ore-  
gon but it is likely safe to as-  
sume that the comparison is sim-

ilar. Everything possible is done by  
the promoters of the liquor traf-  
fic to debauch the unsuspecting  
youth and educate them in the  
use of intoxicants. Some of these  
interests even stoop so  
low as to incise small doses of  
drugs in confectionery in order  
to create an appetite for strong  
drugs in little children.

The liquor barons grovel in  
the lowest depth of infamy in  
their efforts to gratify their lust  
for money. They lay snares for  
the youth that cause them to  
develop habits that destroy mind  
and body, which reduces them  
to the practice of degrading sen-  
sualities and soul and body-ruin-  
ing vices. Cravings are developed  
in the flower of our youth that  
causes them to sell their souls  
for a glass of whiskey.

Young men and women, do not  
permit glittering advertisements  
to mislead you into believing that  
liquor served in glasses over a  
bar is an improvement of the  
present state method. While the  
bottle system of distribution is  
bad, the glass method would be  
worse. It costs less to purchase  
a single glass than it does a  
bottle, thus making it easier to  
obtain. It is an inducement to  
frequent drinking in saloons  
where seasoned drinkers and be-  
ginners meet in convivial asso-  
ciation. It serves to clasp the  
hands of inexperienced youth and  
confirmed whiskey soaks in com-  
mon fellowship. Under this ar-  
rangement every bar becomes a  
training center for the education

of our youth to become addicts  
and criminals.

Be not deceived by statements  
that the labor organizations of  
the country are supporting the  
effort to bring back the bar-glass  
method of serving liquor. The fact  
is that many of the outstanding  
labor leaders of the nation are  
opposed to liquor, and state that  
it is the most vicious stumbling  
block that troubles the progress  
of the laboring man. This holds  
for a majority of athletic lead-  
ers, also.

Do not be tricked into believ-  
ing that the liquor interests of  
Oregon are not behind this effort  
to establish liquor drinking by  
the glass. The liquor interests  
are rich and well-organized and  
are behind this thing for all it  
is worth.
