Supplies necessary for cushion repair are:

One spring-filled cushion in need of repair;

2½ to 3 yards unbleached muslin or the equivalent in flour sacks;

Spool of No. 50 white thread, crochet cotton, string or carpet warp;

Large darning needle;

Heavy linen thread to match material in cushion;

Tape measure;

Package of pins and dozen big safety pins;

Yardstick and pencil;

Scissors, razor blade and your thimble;

Two or three people to assist with the work and bring these supplies in a box.
