This year, all opposition looked weak in comparison until the Pirates entered the quarter and semi-finals. Mapleton, winner in this section of the state, fell, 20 to 7 almost two weeks ago.

Coached by Everett McReynolds, the Pirates have been a high-scoring team all year, running up mammoth scores on most of their opponents, which seemed to be powerless against them. McReynolds has been trying to win a state 'B' hoop crown for the past three years, always losing out in the last few games of the state tournament.

team, during his stay at Dayton, while in grade school. Doyle was center on the grade school basketball team which won county honors, four years ago.

## Oregon Polio Cases Predicted Higher, Impetus For Dimes

PORTLAND, Dec 6 — Added importance was given Oregon's 1949 March of Dimes today by a state board of health prediction that the total number of polio cases in the state in 1948 will be 100 per cent above the figure for the previous year.

"There is every indication that we will have twice as many cases as we had in 1947," Dr. G. D. Carlyle, Thompson, state director of preventative medicine, informed Felix Monttes, state representative for the national foundation for infantile paralysis.

"As of this time last year approximately 90 cases had been reported as compared to our present total for 1948 of 185 cases," Dr. Thompson said. "That means that 1948 already is Oregon's fourth highest year both in number of cases and ratio in respect to population, and there is a slim possibility that it may end as the third highest year."

The final figure on Dec. 31 may exceed 200 cases, according to Dr. Thompson who emphasized, however, that 250 cases would have had to occurred to establish 1948 as an epidemic year in the state as a whole. One case or more per 5000 population is considered epidemic incidence.

The medical man said, though, that there have been epidemics

in Oregon in 1949 "when you consider the definition in terms of the experience of certain counties." He listed these as Polk, Benton and Yamhill, declaring that Polk's 24 cases this year represent a 1-1000 rate and adding that "if Polk were Multanoma county we would be up to our necks in trouble."

Oregon is unusual in that polio attacks many persons in the northwestern part of the state in late autumn and early winter, Dr. Thompson pointed out. Cooler weather invariably results in decreased incidences in other areas, and Dr. Thompson said that the opposite trend in northwestern Oregon "merits a great deal of study."

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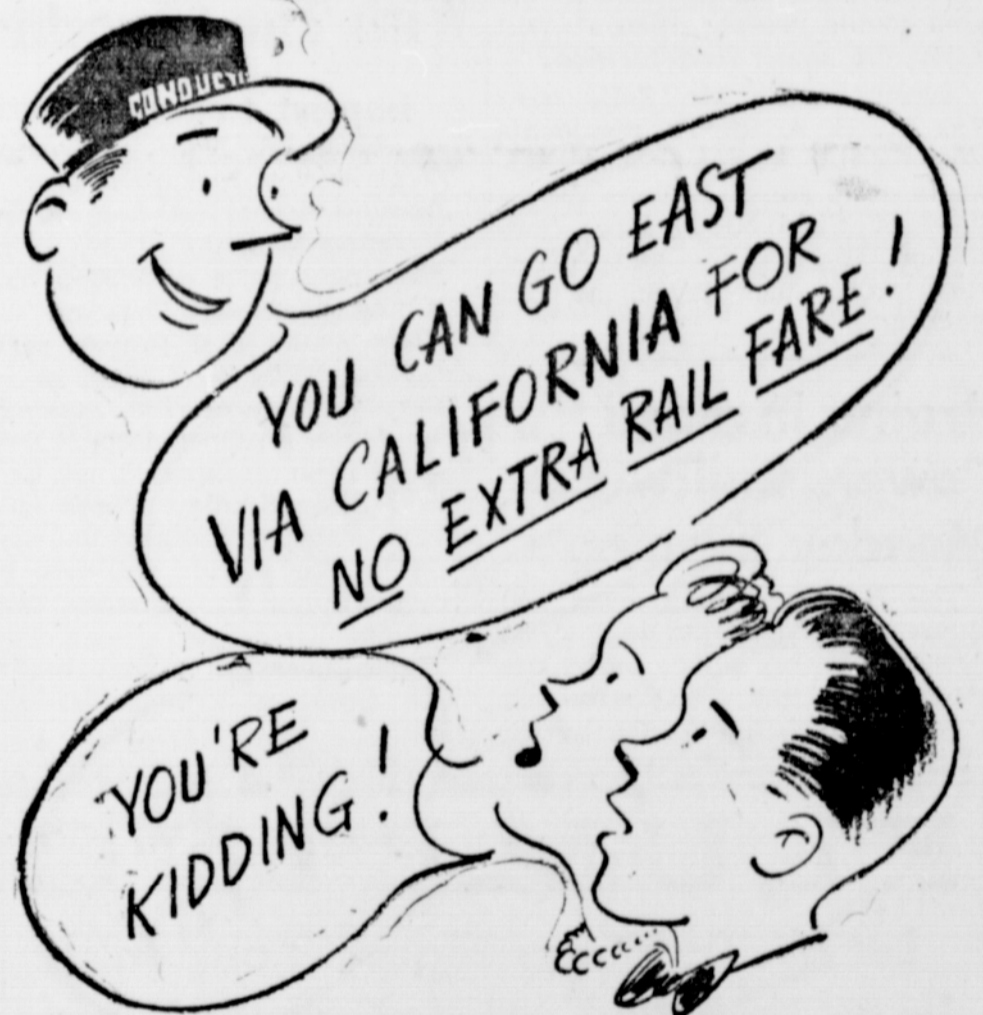
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
