With the approach of the new year, renewal of fishing and hunting licenses are due. War veterans with 25% disability or more are reminded of a state law granting them licenses for a cost of only 50 cents.

Application is made to the Oregon state game commission, 1634 S. W. Alder, Portland, and should be accompanied by a statement from the Veterans Administration as to the percentage of the veteran's disability. Applications may be obtained at any court house.

The same law—Chapter 270, O. L. 1943—also provides hunting licenses to disabled veterans of 50 cents, or a combination hunting-fishing license for \$1. The regular resident fee is \$3.00 for either a fishing or hunting license or \$5.00 for the combination. All persons this year must pay an additional 50 cents for a deer tag. The veteran must have been a resident of Oregon for one year immediately preceding his application for the license.

Also eligible for the reduced license rates are those who have been Oregon residents for 60 years or for 10 years if they are 65 or more years old, providing they are financially unable to pay the regular fee.

So write the veterans administration office holding your case record requesting official confirmation of your disability rating, then apply as above stated.
