Grange Members are reminded that this Friday evening is the annual Christmas program. Each Granger is to bring a gift for the Christmas tree and the supper is pot luck.

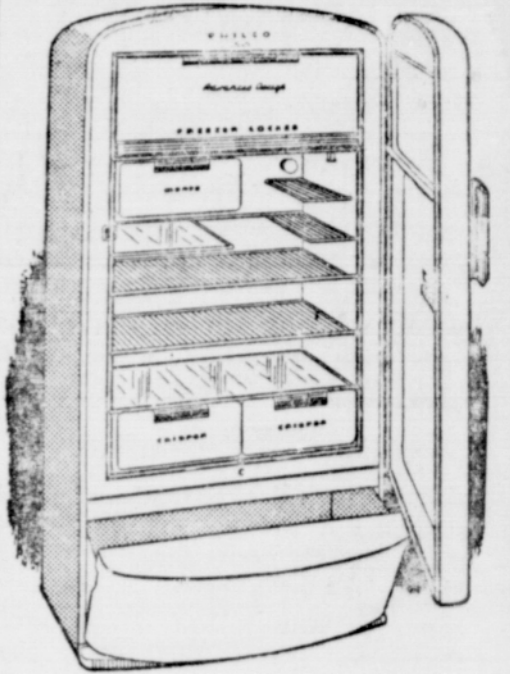
Rev. E. C. Hicks, pastor of the Smith River Methodist church, was a business caller in this area Wednesday.
