

## ROSE BOWL GAME HOLDS NOTHING FOR AVERAGE FAN

### Conference Run By Four Big Universities In Wrong Manner

University of Oregon "Ducks" can't be beaten at the Cotton Bowl game, New Year's day, if the will of Brookings people has anything to do with the outcome.

Nowhere can you find a person willing to bet that Oregon will lose. The concern, however, is how the weather will be, and what Doak Walker, All-American quarterback may be able to do under warm sunshine, if that be the order of the day.

Oregon relies upon its powerful line to halt any ground advance put forth by the Mustangs and upon the passing ability of Norm VanBrocklin, one of the best passers of the nation.

Coach Matty Bell doesn't particularly like the role he and his team have been cast in. By the Williamson rating Southern Methodist has been rated much above Oregon on the scale. He has been doing considerable walling that "tain't fair."

Coach Jim Aiken, of the Ducks

likes his role, and the campaigner with the gravel-toned voice is quiet on his predictions, saying, "We'll give them a game like they want."

Traveling men making this territory, say that the entire west is apparently more interested in the Cotton Bowl game than in the Rose Bowl. One of these told the Pilot, Monday that he was going to listen to the Cotton Bowl game, and that would be over in time to listen to the East-West Shrine game at Kezar stadium, San Francisco.

#### Rose Bowl Popularity Wanes

Sports writers, even in California where the Golden Bears reign with an iron rule, are belittling the Rose Bowl game as "a farce." The action by the conference, ruled by University of Southern California, U. C. L. A., University of California, University of Washington, signing a 5-year contract with the Big Nine conference has broken the popularity the Rose Bowl has enjoyed since its beginning in 1915.

Fans who pour out the money to make these games possible, feel that they are not seeing representative teams play, especially this year, when Northwestern, second-place winner, is the Big Nine choice. Rules say that no Big Nine team can come two years in a row. Michigan won in 1947 and again this year.

Oregon, co-champions for 1948, were ruled out by one vote in the conference, with University of Idaho voting for California. By this action Idaho and Montana universities may be voted out of the conference next year if the two Oregon schools and Washington State College can have their way.

Gene Gould predicts that the Northwestern Wildcats will be 13 points better than California in the Rose Bowl, basing his predictions on the way California finished the season.

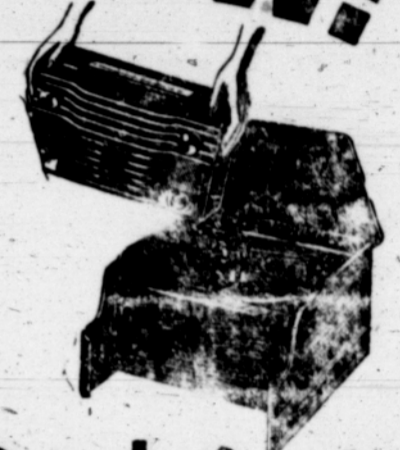
