Ambulance Will Need Insurance Next Few Months

March 22, 1948, the amount of the ambulance fund was \$1261.99—from this amount, \$800 was taken to buy the ambulance, the purchase price of which was \$750. The remaining \$50 were used for running expense and for the buying of equipment, such as pillow slips, sheets, etc.
The balance of the fund, \$461.99—was left in the I. O. O. F. treasury to be held until formation of the Ambulance Inc. All ambulance expenses from March 22 to May 18, 1948, were paid in cash from the earnings of the ambulance, or fees.
May 8, the remaining \$461.99 was placed on deposit at Bank of America, Crescent City, in a checking account. All income has been so deposited, and expenses have been paid by check.
Practically all ambulance runs have been emergency calls, 35 round trips to Crescent City and Gold Beach, and one trip to Eugene, 2783 miles in all. Drivers were Val Mendenhall Sr. with 29 trips to his credit; Roy Stephenson with 2 trips to his and one double with Mendenhall; Leo Lucas with 2 trips and a double with Mendenhall; Lloyd Harbin, with one trip, the last in 1948.
At this time there is \$140.33 in the bank account. Fees for ambulance service, still unpaid, amount to \$113.55—most of the amount awaiting action of Industrial Accident Commission of Oregon and Washington. It will come along in good time. If this is paid our bank account would amount to \$253.88.
On July 9, just six months from now, we must have \$361.31 for ambulance insurance again—full coverage for drivers, helpers and all persons being transported.
What do you think? You surely will make your Ambulance Incorporated men happy if you can make a donation. These men sacrifice their time, you might do a little with money.
It requires about 3½ hours to make a round trip to either

Gold Beach or Crescent City. These drives have donated that 2783 miles of driving time at personal financial loss without a single squawk. Your secretary has donated hours in changing linen, cleaning and blankets on stretchers for 32 to of the 35 trips, requiring from one to five hours each time.
There is C. A. MacKenzie who has donated the laundry which is no small item. Chas Schaal has re-covered the ambulance cushions and has made a water-proof cover for the stretcher mattress.
The Pilot publisher has space for the cause.
