

'Dimes' Drive To Run, Jan. 14 to 31

The foregoing have volunteered their services in the drive to raise funds for the victims of infantile paralysis.

The county was again fortunate in that no new case occurred during the past year. However, in Oregon the number of cases of polio or infantile paralysis in 1948 were more than double the number in 1947. In the United States the number of cases of the disease reached an all-time high of approximately 30,000 cases, exceeding the previous record occurrence of 27,000 in 1916.

North Carolina, Texas, and California were the 1948 centers of the disease. \$17,000,000 was spent for medical aid alone, and of this amount the antional headquarters supplied \$6,500,000 to county chapters whose funds had been exhausted by Nov. 30.

The need for a successful campaign this year has never been greater. Since its beginning in 1938, the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis has, through the March of Dimes, been able to provide the best available medical care to every victim of the disease. If this policy and the research and educational program of the organization are to continue, the 1949 March of Dimes will have to be the greatest ever.

Curry county and the State of Oregon have always been outstanding contributors to March of Dimes. Last year Oregon was fourth in the United States and Curry county ranked 16th out of Oregon's 36 counties on a per capita basis. Curry county campaign workers are fully confident that the emergency will be met.

Brookings Postal Receipts Are High

Postal receipts at Brookings post office jumped \$2,005.62 in 1948 over the 1947 total, Mrs. Goldie Smith, post master, revealed Saturday. The total stamp sales, which determines the class of post office were \$7,853.23 for 1947. The next year the sales totaled \$9,858.85.

The last quarter of 1948 showed \$595.76 increase over the corresponding quarter of 1947, or about one-fourth of the year's increase.

Monery order business which has no bearing on the class of post office, for Brookings was revealed as \$133,687.04 for 1948.

Brookings post office was elevated to second class about a year ago, due to the increase in postal revenue. The revenue last year, Mrs. Smith asserted, makes the second class rating much more secure.

Selective Service Questions Cleared

Clarifying provisions of the selective service act, Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy state director of selective service for Oregon, said in an interview late last week that local boards have no authority under the present law to accept volunteers for immediate induction, unless they are over 26.

Col. Mason observed that the general misunderstanding probably arose from the fact that local boards were empowered to accept volunteers under the selective service act which expired in 1947.

"The present law is clear," Col. Mason said, and he quoted from recent instructions sent to all Oregon local boards as follows:

"Except in respect to registrants 26 years of age or over who may consent to induction, the selective service act of 1948 contains no provision authorizing the induction of volunteer registrants before the time that such registrants are selected for induction according to their dates of birth as prescribed in selective service regulations.

"Any registrant who is within the age group 19 through 25 may apply at an army recruiting station for enlistment in the regular army for a period of 21 months

service which is the same period of service for which he is liable under the selective service act of 1948. No such registrants, however, is eligible to enlist after an order to report for armed forces physical examination has been issued to him by his local board."

Col. Mason expressed his appreciation to the press and radio for wonderful co-operation in the keeping the public informed on matters pertaining to selective service.
