## JIMMY VINCENT LEAVES TUESDAY ON SCOUT TRIP

Will Be Given Many Dinners And Honors By Various Groups

Jimmy Vincent, chosen by Region XI, to represent it at National Scout Week festivities at Washington, D. C., and New York City, now knows his itinerary.

He will leave Brookings next Tuesday noon (Feb 1) for Eugene where he will attend a scout dinner that evening.

Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee of Portland will present him to the Portland city council at noon, Wednesday, Oswego troop of Boy Scouts and Cub pack, of which Jim was a former member, will have a dinner in his honor that evening.

He leaves Portland at 3:00 Thursday afternoon on the Empire Builder of the Great Northern with a scout guard of honor bidding him farewell. He reaches Chicago Saturday afternoon, Feb. 5. There he will be met by Scout executives and entertained until Monday afternoon when he leaves for Washington.

He joins 11 other Eagle scouts at the Willard hotel. Next morning they attend the scout breakfast, where high-ranking government officials and the state representatives from each boy's district will be present.

Three days will be spent attending scout week ceremonies at Washington.

From the capital the boys will go to New York where the closing ceremonies of National Scout Week will be held on Feb. 12 at the Statue of Liberty.

Jim's homeward trip will take him through New Orleans, but about a week too early for the famed Mardi Gras, thence on to Los Angeles and thence home.

Brookings Rotary club, sponsors of Sea Scout Ship 232, has provided Jim with his uniform and \$25. The Rod and Gun Club likewise gave Jim \$25 for incidentals not included in expenses paid by the Scout organization.

## R. G. SABIN WAS ROTARY GUEST SPEAKER, TUES.

R. G. (Glenn) Sabin, Curry county sheriff, was the principal speaker, Tuesday noon, at Rotary luncheon, describing "The Sheriff's Job." In Oregon, he told Rotarians, the sheriff has two jobs: first, that of law enforcement officer, and second, that of tax collector.

"I wish it known that I am in no way responsible for taxes, for assessments and the different levies. The assessment rolls are turned over to me in late September of each year, and it is the duty of my office to make out statements for collection."

"Many people are led to believe that the sheriff determines this, but the average sheriff is not thankful of this duty the law has thrown upon his shoulders. The sheriff is only the collector."

Sheriff Sabin read a letter he received from a Port Orford woman, censuring him for the fact that "rural school" levy had been placed against her property.

"Law enforcement," the sheriff pointed out, "comprises sundry duties. He may be called upon to stop a family row, to hunt for a child who has run away, to form a posse to look for someone lost in the woods or he may be called upon to apprehend a criminal."

"Smaller counties do not provide deputies sufficient to carry on all the work coming under the "duty" of a sheriff. Sometimes office work must suffer as outside duties call for the attention of the sheriff. Later the reverse may be true."
