Fishing Regulations—
In the tentative fishing regulations for 1949, which will become law unless changed by the game commission this Friday,

there is a proposal to close the Chetco River to winter angling above Bruce Hole. This was recommended by the Southwest Sportsmen association with the thought in mind that it will prevent anglers from taking spawning salmon from their beds in the upper river.

However, it would also close this stretch of river to steelhead angling since the winter season runs from Oct. 1 to Feb. 28. The Chetco Rod and Gun Club is sending a delegate to the game commission's meeting at Portland this Friday, protesting this proposed action. Since spawning salmon are taken below Bruce Hole as readily as above this spot, there is no point in closing the upper river where very few fish. Southwest Oregon sportsmen's association has no representation from this area and the members of the local club feel that they should have been consulted before such a recommendation was made.

Chetco Rod and Gun Club is a member of the Oregon Wildlife Federation. This latter organization is made up of clubs from all over the state, and is proposing far-reaching legislation regarding fish and game conditions in the state. One of the biggest changes which will be introduced into legislature is the proposal to take the enforcement of game laws from the jurisdiction of the state police and set up a game warden system directly responsible to the game commission and to double the number of enforcement officers who will also be charged with game management and education of the public on conservation of game. The legislation will also contain a proposal to pay these officers from the general fund instead of from the game fund as is the case at present.

Only by organization and unified action can progressive legislation be passed. This is the best argument for the idea that every hunter and angler should belong to and support some conservation club such as the Chetco Rod and Gun Club.

The Portland Journal is again sponsoring a "telegraphic trap shoot" this year. The club will again enter this shoot and all interested shooters are urged to see Dr. A. O. Schmitt, club chairman of this team. Shooting will

be done each Sunday morning at White Rock.

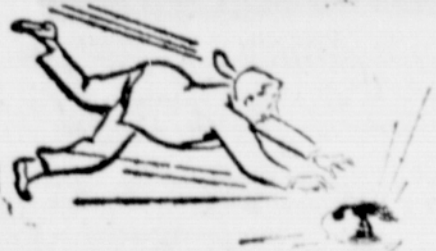
