

BRUINS WINNERS OF CURRY COUNTY TOURNAMENT

Dumped Gold Beach, Thursday; Ophir Was Victim, Friday Eve

Brookings Bruins, coached by the rapidly-balding and "nail-chewing" Arthur Guthrie, went out Friday evening and won the second consecutive county hoop championship at the county tournament, held at Gold Beach.

Thursday night, pitted against the talented and fast Gold Beach quintet, the Bruins got off to a slow start and looked bad, behind, 13-3 at the quarter. At the half the Bruins were ahead, 18 to 17, and really went to town in the third quarter, when they rained in points so fast that the fans became bewildered. The second team held the advantage in the fourth quarter.

Ophir Really "Bit the Dust"

Needled all year by Mr. Hawkins, Ophir coach, Guthrie found the same man in what remaining hair he had Friday evening when the Bruins faced the Ophir team in the play-offs Guthrie let his boys know that Hawkins had a "poor opinion" of their abilities.

To leave no question in the minds of fans, the Bruins, Friday went out to smother the Ophir aggregation 60 to 31, which, by the partisan group, was believed held that way by Guthrie's love of humanity. At no time could there be any question in the most partisan quarters that Ophir had any chance, even if plenty of "Ophir money" was flashed before the game.

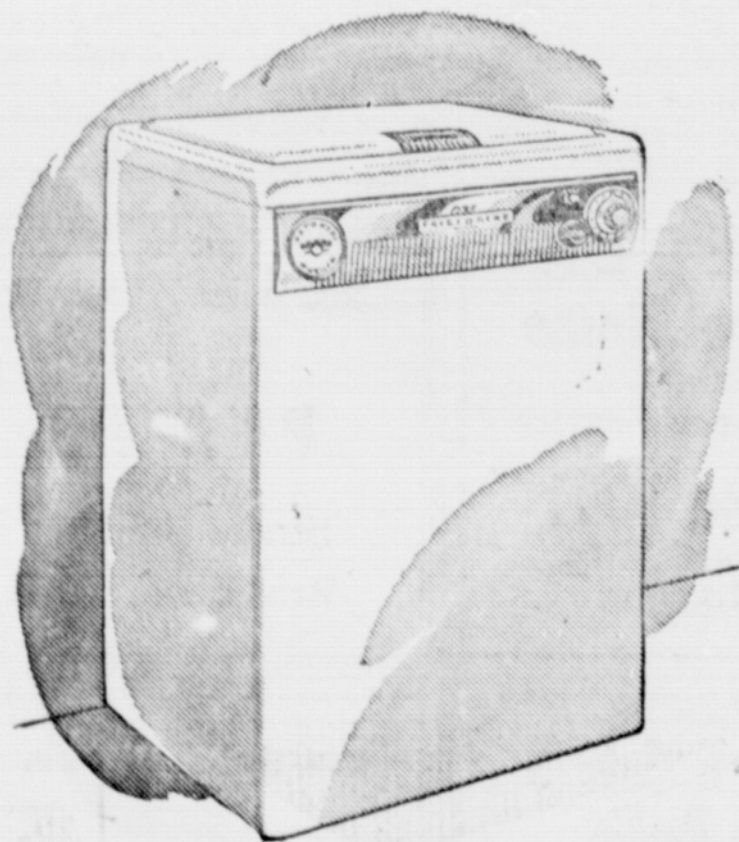
