Evolution Is Theory Said Lecturer, Sun.

"Evolution is, after all, just a scientific theory and not a scientific fact. Scientific theories are man-made. Scientific facts are God-made. True science recognizes and records God-made facts. False science interprets these God-made facts into unproven and unprovable man-made theories."

With these remarks Pastor L. VanDolson introduced his lecture entitled "God's Answer to Evolution" at the Chetco Inn last Sunday night.

He went on to say, "Evolution and the Bible story of creation are poles apart and never can be correlated. Evolution teaches that man originated from patriarchal polliwogs and ancestral apes and that he's in the process

of improving himself and may finally reach perfection all by himself."

"The Bible teaches that God created man perfect in His own image and placed him in Paradise. According to the Genesis record man fell—blundered his way right out of Paradise—and thus the only way he can ever reach ultimate perfection, peace, and happiness is by accepting Jesus Christ as his Savior and Redeemer. These two views cannot be reconciled. Therefore we are forced to choose either the theory of evolution or the Bible and Jesus Christ."

"It takes a lot more faith to accept the evolutionary theory than it does to accept the simple Bible record of six literal days of creation. Especially when we realize that nothing is impossible for the God of heaven. It seems an absurdity for men who are mere lumps of carbon and water that crawl about on the surface of our insignificant dot of an earth to try to tell the God who created and controls the universe just how He accomplished His work of creation."

The Bible plainly tells us, and the great preponderance of supporting evidence clearly indicates that God created our earth in six literal days and on the seventh day formed His great answer to evolution, the seventh-day Sabbath.

"If man had always kept the seventh-day Sabbath there never would have been an evolutionist for no one who kept one day out of seven in honor of God's work of creation and recreation

through Jesus Christ would ever forget the great Bible facts of creation."
