## IT SEEMS TO ME:

Remarks in this column come not from local fans who attended the district tournament at Coos Bay, but mainly from people in Gold Beach and other county districts, so will give Pilot readers an idea of the conduct of athletic contests over the state as far as "B" tournaments are concerned.

Schools represented at the district tournament permitted the A school officials to conduct the tournament, their first mistake. B schools are beneath the dignity of A schools, which feel superior, conduct their tournaments in a superior manner, and feel that they can be superior before boys who have earned the right to represent their various counties in the tournament.

"A" officiating is carried on in a manner which cares nothing for the development of the athletes—it is for the show, if they want to label their actions in any way. It reminds one of attending a marble tournament, instead of a husky, he-man hoop contest.

Boys are taught to be sportsmen. They are constantly told that officials are above reproach—on the level. Broken faith in these officials causes boys no end of misery, and forever puts them in the belief that their coaches and principals have been fibbing to them. Riddle coach simply is

a fit subject for the asylum at Salem. Other coaches are only a small degree below that so-called "deep-end."

Other county schools, who had covetous feelings toward the so-called county championship, were first to come on the floor after the tournament, Saturday night and tell Brookings and Riddle players that they never had before seen such amateurish refereeing. Among this group was Mr. Hawkins of Ophir, who was by no means circumspect in his remarks.

Boys who win under such circumstances, as well as those who lose, lose more than the game—they have lost faith in mankind—faith which could easily carry them to greater victories later in life. The only solution for relief is for the state athletic association to hold a school for officials, and standardize the officiating.

The Pilot wishes to remind the lads who felt that they had been given a "raw deal" that life is quite a bit that way—survival of the fittest. However, later in life, they will find out that this practice has been all wrong.

Brookings walked off the floor Saturday night by far the most popular with the fans, despite what a certain official might've done to them. After all, public opinion counts for something.
