LONG SESSION NOW SEEN

The tax issue won't jell. At the opening of the present legislative session there were only two announced plans for refurbishing Oregon's dilapidated and long neglected tax structure. Now there are nearly as many plans as there are members. During between-session huddles inspirations pop like flash blubs. Neoteric members are learning the hard way that this is not a push-button government. A state of disconcerted opinions forebodes rough seas for the bulky report of the big joint ways and means committee.

As the legislators bored into the eighth week—without their \$8-a-day salary—only 71 of the 728 bills introduced had been passed and sent to the governor for his approval or veto. There were 144 in house committees and 148 in senate committee. Few of the major problems have had attention. There is just too much legislative business in this rapidly-growing state to fit the pattern of past Oregon legislative sessions.

Henry Semon (d) from Klamath, chairman of the house ways and means committee, who has been a member of this committee during nine sessions and the chairman of five, says this session has 50% heavier and more intricate problems than any other he has participated in.

Predictions for a 100-day session are commonplace now at the capitol. Prevailing estimates are that the session will tie or exceed the record breaking session of 1947 which lasted 83 days.

NEW LAWS ADOPTED

This week Gov. McKay signed bills passed by the legislature which will:

Allow banks to close on Saturday if they so desire. Present law requires them to remain open on Saturdays.

Provide that a license shall not be required for hunting, trapping or angling for a resident of this state who actually resides on the premises on which he hunts, traps or fishes.

Increases the charge for a certificate made by a clerk for furnishing copy of photostatic records from 25 to 50 cents.

Make possible the creation of water districts in summer home areas.

Authorize the fish commission to co-operate with and accept financial aid from the federal government.

Reduce the age limit for entering the national guard from 18 to 17 years.

RECENT LEGAL OPINIONS

Amended Oregon law provides legal and adequate authority for district school boards of districts of the first class to sell school

the district and no longer needed for school purposes.

Real property acquired by a county by foreclosure of delinquent tax liens is taxable when leased or rented to persons whose property is taxable.

A stream or river may be navigable notwithstanding interruption of its navigability by rapids and other natural obstructions.

A justice of the peace is entitled to no other compensation for his official services than that fixed by the county court except any fees he may collect for the performance of marriage ceremonies.

Setting off and establishing justice of the peace districts in a county within the discretion of county court.

County court is authorized by Oregon laws to offer and pay additional bounties for predatory animals.

With a group of younger candidates he addressed a gathering at a country school house. After the meeting all candidates lined up near the door to shake hands as the prospective voters departed. A state income tax agent will be at the Gold Beach court house March 11 from 8 a. m. to noon, it was announced by letter from the tax commission.

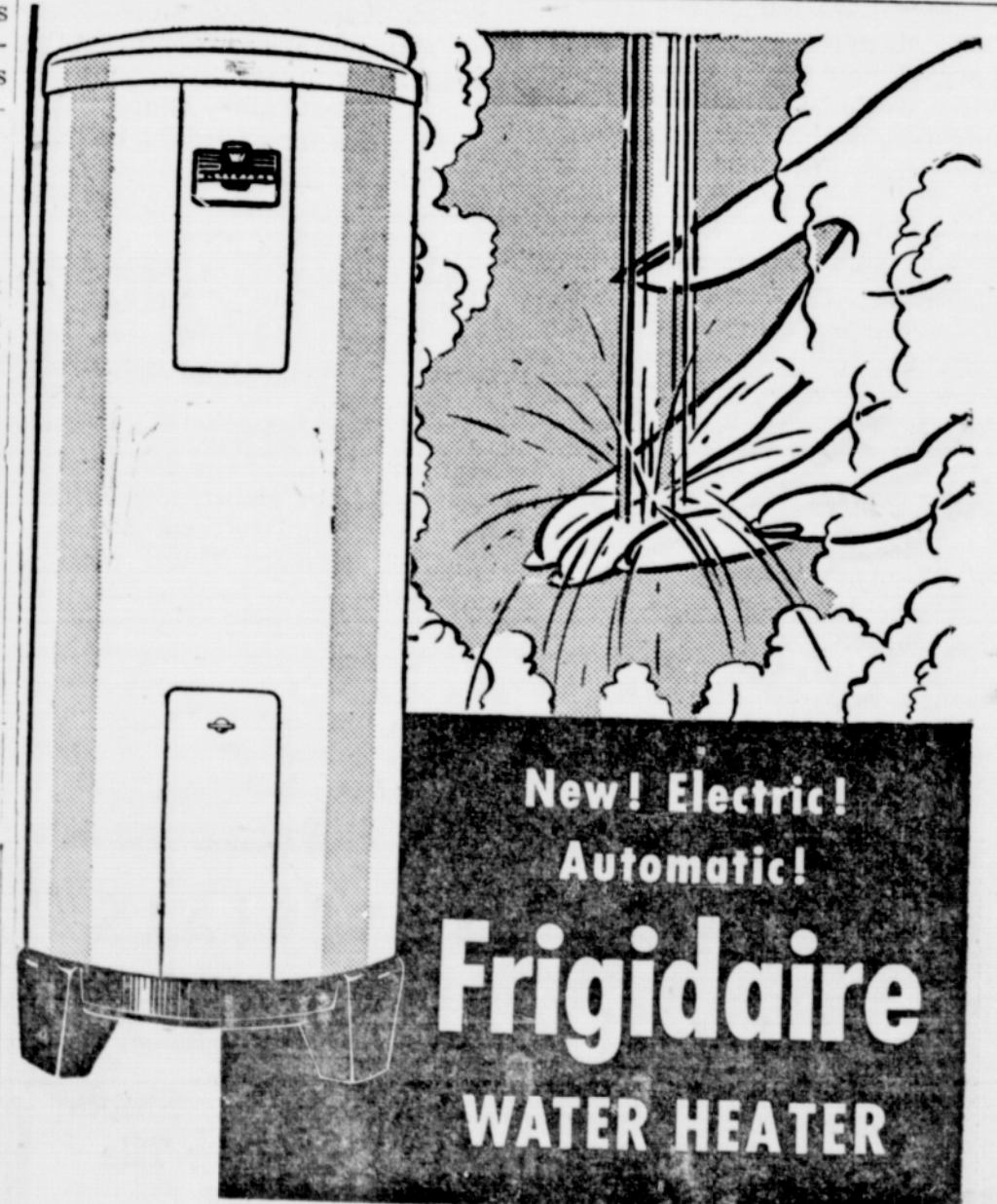

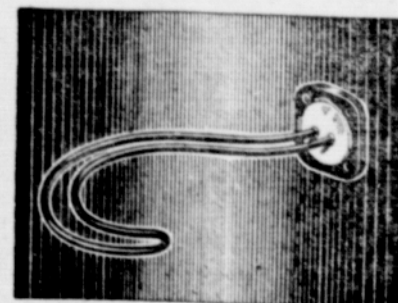
