4-H Club Week Is Being Observed

GOLD BEACH—"Better Living for a Better World" is the slogan this year that points up the observance of national 4-H week, March 5 to 13, in Oregon, the remaining 47 states, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, states L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader.

This week marks the 34th year the 4-H club work has been an important off-campus program of Oregon State College extension service in co-operation with the department of agriculture. Latest figures released by L. J. Allen indicate a total of 2675 different Oregon 4-H clubs which include a membership of 26,000 boys and girls between ages of 9 and 21.

Any Oregon boy or girl—city or rural—between those ages is eligible to belong. Allen is frank to admit that past and future success of Oregon 4-H program rests in the hands of volunteer local 4-H leaders. These unpaid people are the leaders who give their valuable time and "know-how" to 4-H youngsters. He says 2575 different persons acted as

club leaders during the past year, each leading one or more clubs.

Local leaders have organized into county associations, and an over-all state 4-H local leaders association exists under Mrs. E. F. Wright of Portland.

A "project" is the basis for 4-H club program. Choosing from a total of about 25 different projects, the club member owns his own project no matter what it is. One of the most worth while lessons club members learn from their projects in addition to new knowledge is responsibility and "how to work," Allen believes.

Oregon club members carried a total of 31,379 projects during the 1948 year. They cared for 13,823 birds in poultry projects, 1896 dairy cattle, 2009 head of sheep, 1061 hogs, and 1042 beef animals. Members of food preservation clubs served 21,638 meals and canned or froze 59,357 quarts of fruit, vegetables and meats.

Clothing club members made 13,923 articles including 2259 dresses and suits.
