By trying to follow action by congress, as well as that of our own Oregon legislature, I must admit that I am becoming more

be getting nowhere fast. It is now guessed that there will be no repeal—merely some amendments to the present law. In his column weekly, Cong. Harris Ellsworth tries to keep his people of the Fourth district informed of actions in congress. A study of this column is enlightening to all.

The World War 2 vets of Oregon may get a bonus, but how to finance the bill has the legislature in a dither. A cigarette tax has been proposed, but most of the representatives and senators do not "go along" with that idea. The cigarettes are already carrying a heavy tax and more of this seems to hit troubled waters from dealers.

The controversial oleo tax bill seems to have gained favorable adjustment in the house of representatives in Washington. The Senate approval has not as yet been voted. Oleo may not be colored, but predictions say that no tax will be assessed.

The so-called aid to Europe is running into trouble times, but its passage and continuance is an assured fact, for this year at least, the daily press indicates. The Russian situation, however, is getting no better fast. Russia has done everything possible to prevent the formation of the Atlantic pact, designed as a defense measure against spread of communism. That pact is a reality despite Russia's efforts to put it away.

It seems to me that a readjustment of prices will take place more than already has in the next few months, but all of this seems to be for the country's good. A stability is being wrought

for the nation's economy, which will tend to straighten out much of the labor unrest.

Behind all this movement and counter movement between labor and capital seems to be labor's seeking a security. Once capital recognizes this as such, and makes adjustments in that direction, a peace will come to our economic times.

Demands for goods still remains about as high as immediately following the war, but the war-flush pocketbooks are little thinner, thus the cause for lowering of prices. Easing of credits will bring about a new surge in consumer buying.
