## In The Mail-box:

Editor, Pilot: As you of course know, our community has been trying for some time to persuade the government to improve the harbor at the mouth of Rogue River. Your citizens there have very generously supported and aided us in this effort.

You will therefore understand our amazement to learn of the recent attitude toward our harbor project by your chamber of commerce or at least the attitude attributed to your chamber of commerce.

Our committee for the harbor project recently submitted to the legislature a memorial to congress reading as follows:

*"To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:*

*"We, your memorialists, the senate and the house of representatives of the state of Oregon, in legislative session assembled, most respectfully represent and petition as follows:*

*"Whereas, for lack of adequate transportation facilities, the development of southwestern Oregon, and particularly Curry county, has been and is hampered and held back; and*

*"Whereas, in particular vast areas of virgin timber in the said area have remained and still remain largely undeveloped, much of which said timber is now over-ripe and deteriorating in quality and condition due to the attacks of disease and insects attendant upon over-maturity; and*

*"Whereas, the development of said timber resources under present conditions is unduly wasteful and uneconomical by reason of the high costs of such transportation facilities as now are available; and*

*"Whereas, the mouth of the Rogue River on the Oregon coast is a potential harbor, which if developed, would be adequate and sufficient for the economical transportation to market of the timber products and other commodities of Curry county and for the development of the timber and other natural resources of said county; and*

*"Whereas, the mouth of the said Rogue river is centrally located in a strip of undeveloped coast line more than 100 miles in length, the longest piece of coast-line in continental United States without development of harbor facilities; now therefore,*

*"Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Oregon, the House of Representatives jointly concurring therein:*

*"That the congress of the United States be and it hereby is memorialized to enact legislation and to make appropriations for the development of a harbor suitable and sufficient for ocean shipping at the mouth of the river on the Oregon coast in Curry county, Oregon; and be it further*

*"Resolved, that the secretary of state of the state of Oregon be and he hereby is directed to transmit copies of this memorial to the president of the senate and to the speaker of the house of representatives of the United States congress and to each senator and representative therein representing the people of the state of Oregon."*

The memorial passed House of Representatives some time ago.

Our committee, of course, never dreamed that any other community in this county would take offense over anything stated in this memorial.

We are advised that a telegram ostensibly coming from your chamber of commerce has been sent to the legislative delegations from Curry, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath counties. The telegram reads:

*"Emphatically protest house resolution reference development Rogue mouth as impractical all*

## I WRITE as I See It!

"And as he said upon the mount of Olives, the Disciples came unto Him privately, saying: Tell us, when shall these things be? And what shall be the sign of thy coming, and of the end of the world? And Jesus answered and said unto them, Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ; and shall deceive many. And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars: See that ye be not troubled; for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows." Matt. 24:3-8.

War, as waged by the nations, horrendous though it is, it is exceeded by the aftermath of misery and degradation it leaves behind. As the Lord declared, "war is the beginning of sorrows." Armies locked in mortal combat express the ultimate of human endeavor to pacify its conflicting opinions of right and wrong. War recognizes no law but force, and submit or die is

its watchword. Such is war as human wisdom understands it.
