

P.-T. A. HAS FOUR-POINT PROGRAM, MRS. HENDRICKS TOLD ROTARIANS

National Congress of Parents and Teachers, the national organization of Parent-Teacher Association, is made up of over 5,000,000 members, Mrs. A. P. Hendricks, local president, told Brookings Rotary Club, Tuesday noon. Started in 1897, this association was organized for the sole purpose of promoting child welfare of the nation. Guiding all action of the group is a four-point program, comprising Parent education; Health of the youth, World understanding and better Parent-Family relationship over the nation.

"As in case of all organizations," Mrs. Hendricks said in urging better relationship between P.-T. A. and Rotary, "the strength of the P.-T. A. does not lie in its inactive members. A group composed of a few active members is much more effective than a large one with a large roster of members who are indifferent.

"P.-T. A. is made up of the local unit, the state unit and the national congress. Oregon's state conference will be held late this month at Eugene. The national conclave is set at St. Louis in May, when all states will send delegates to discuss problems of the association.

"This year, P.-T. A. is concentrating its efforts on parent education, to acquaint parents of their responsibility in reference to the future of the youth.

"The health of the youth, that they may grow up strong and useful citizens is equally as important, and is stressed much by local groups. World Understanding is being accomplished by the training of the youth to look at problems of other youth under those circumstances existing in foreign lands.

"Good children come from the homes where there is a broad understanding between parents and children."

Mrs. Hendricks told Rotarians how the local unit tried to carry out each section of the four-point plan, by holding pre-school clinics, by obtaining all information possible to increase the parents' understanding of the child's big problems and by the co-operation with the faculty.

"Wednesday night the picture, 'Human Growth,' will be shown to parents that they may better answer questions of children concerning facts of life as children are known to ask."

Lynn Hampton, superintendent of Brookings schools, told of the specific cases where P.-T. A. had aided in the conduct of the local schools since had become member of the community.

Seedling Trees Planted By F. S. At Cave Junction

GRANTS PASS—A tree planting project involving the planting of 50,000 douglas fir seedlings was initiated on the Page Creek district of the Siskiyou national forest, Monday, April 4. Transplants are two and three years old and were grown at the forest Wind River nursery, near Carson, Wash.

These trees are being planted on about 80 acres of land cut-over through recent timber sales operations. While sufficient fires were left on the area to provide seed, planting is being done in attempt to get young trees started before the brush has a chance to grow and retard re-stocking.

The project is financed by a portion of the receipts from the stumpage which was cut from the area a procedure made possible through legislation. There eight men employed on the job and it is estimated they will complete the project in about ten days. District Ranger Harold Boserman of Cave Junction is personally supervising the work.
