upon question of increasing tax levy over amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 17, Curry County, State of Oregon, at School house, at 8:00 p. m. Monday, May 23, in said district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the year 1949 over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reason for increasing such levy are: For increased cost of operation, due to the recent failure of the Rural School Board to equalize necessary items of District No. 17 budget.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said year is \$15,731.70.
