## Joe Endert Tells Of Early-Days And Indians, To Rotary

On his second appearance before Brookings Rotary Club, Joe Endert, 71, of Crescent City, resumed the talk he started some weeks ago about the Indians and early-day lore in that section.

This time Mr. Endert told about the establishing of a store on the Klamath in the late '50s by a man named Snyder. New to the ways of the Indians, Snyder later was killed when the Indians demanded his life for the lives of several Indians lost as they were freighting, by canoe, provisions from Crescent City to his store.

The story had a long ending, inasmuch as the soldiers stationed in that area, sought to arrest the slayer.

Indian lore has it that the Indian was found at the mouth of the Klamath, there killed and beheaded with the head being returned to the garrison. As this was insufficient evidence, the soldiers demanded the body, which was later returned. Indians still claim that the head tried to speak as it was being carried in and when they returned to find the body, it was walking about, seeking its head. Burial was a difficult thing in this case for Indians believed that the head and body would eventually become attached, and the result would be a devil.

Mr. Endert, who enjoys telling this lore, promised the club he would return again as soon as the program could be arranged.
