

### Community Concert Campaign Starts May 9 For Members

CRESCENT CITY — Sale of memberships in the Del Norte Community Concert Association will begin Monday, May 9, and continue through Friday, May 13. No membership will be available after that date.

The association, headed by Rev. J. L. Butler, will seek to bring a series of three and possibly four community concerts during 1949 and 1950, to music-lovers in Del Norte and southern Curry county in September to March.
