

Baseball Season To Open Here, Sunday

It will be the first baseball of the season for Brookings fans at the local high school field next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, when the "Pelicans" meet the strong Glendale nine in the opening play of the Rogue valley league.

Lack of pre-season games, and also lack of practice sessions the week or more, may find the Pelicans not too-well primed for the opening day, however, Manager Swearingen has scheduled a work out for Thursday evening and is hoping to give the Glendale boys a tough game.

The probable starting line-up for the Sunday fray will be Homer Haggerty at first base; Ray Gardner at second, Leo Spangler on the short-patch and Whitey Matson on the hot corner. Vern Hanscam, Neil Nelson and Val Mendenhall are likely nominees for the outfield.

Strong-armed Dick Salvage is likely to start on the mound with Tommy Hawkins, the Ophir high coach, behind the plate. Other players who may see action are Paul Maris, Leland White and Babe Swearingen. Harold Putnam who has been working out at third base, is reported ill at his home.

Due to seven teams in Rogue Valley League, Brookings draws a bye on the 15th but meets the Cave Junction team here on May 22, the Azalea Festival week-end.
