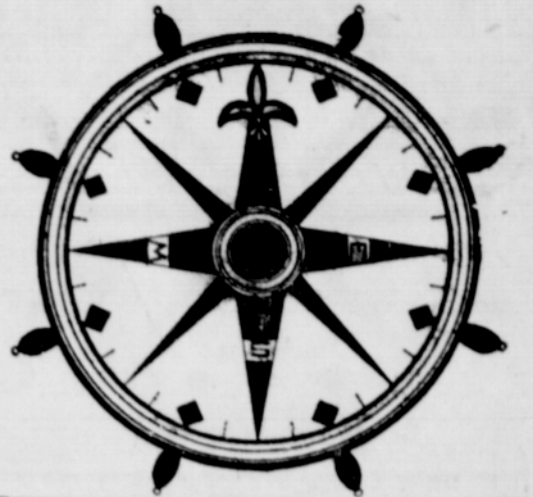

## Flower Show Said To Be Best Ever Held In Area; Art Exhibit "Drew Attention"

With visitors constantly coming in during visiting hours, Saturday and Sunday, the Festival Flower Show for 1949 was said by most visitors to be the best ever held in this area. This was attributed to the better arrangements, result of experiences in all previous show. Adding to the attraction of the flowers was an art display which gave the event a different meaning.

The registration of 2750 did not include children or those who came and went a number of times, but did include the 61 delegates.

## Funds Restored To School Budget By 169 to 71 Vote

At the special school election, Monday evening, at the school, voters of district No. 17 emphatically voiced their approval of restoration to the school budget that amount deleted from the original budget by the Rural School Board, 169 to 71.

Of the 242 votes cast, two of them were thrown out for reason of faulty marking.

Despite all the publicity given about the action of the Rural School board, many people of the district still did not understand the situation in face of the ultimatum of the state department of education.

Following the voting several who had voted against the issue claimed they never understood, or that they might have voted differently.

Restoration of this amount to the budget will mean, for one thing, another teacher in high school, recommended by state board of education.
