

JULY 4 TENTATIVELY SET FOR 3rd ANNUAL LILY BLOSSOM PARADE

Group Met Tuesday To Lay Plans For Coming Event; Lily Blossoms Are Earlier This Year

With most local growers reporting that the lily blossoms were much in advance this year, over last year, plans were tentatively set, Tuesday evening by the Lily Blossom Parade committee, to hold the third annual parade and celebration here Monday, July 4.

Organization of the committee was completed, and committees were appointed to be ready to report at the next meeting, set for Thursday evening, June 2, at 8, at Grayshel's restaurant.

First order of the business of the lily committee appointed by growers some time ago, was to supplement the number with a number from all organizations of the area. George Funk was unanimously named president of the group, with the vice-presidency left open until some one from the lumber industry could be called in on the committee. Nell Parker was named secretary-treasurer.

Finances Discussed

To raise funds to carry on the parade ways and means of raising money were discussed at some length. Cans will be placed in all business with appropriate signs attached to get the average citizen who would likely not be contacted for funds. Dances will be held, with probable shows.

Committees Named

To aid the finance committee, consisting of Homer Haggerty, Art Bollinger and Dewey Akers, an entertainment committee consisting of Charles Grayshel, C. O. Leonard and G. P. Christenson will devise means of adding to the finances through entertainment before and during the lily blossom time.

That which makes the parade—the floats were discussed to a great length, with an effort being made to include on this committee a person representing every industry in the area. The present committee is made up of: Bill Duggan for the truckers; Fred Moore, business houses of the area; Cliff Brimm, sawmills; B. J. Gould and Earl Livingston for comics; Leo Lucas for horses, assisted by Eddie Thornton; bicycles and juveniles, Mrs. Archie Hendricks.

Advertising Discussed

Charles Grayshel told the assembly that he had already contacted Commander Scott of the Greyhound "Romance of the Highways," and that he had been promised not only a program, but engraved cards to be handed out with lilies to all Greyhound passengers coming through this area. Mr. Gordon of Standard Oil Co. public relations told Mr. Grayshel recently that he would, if dates were set soon enough, try to see that a Standard Oil Co. camera man could be here for the parade.

To look after newspaper advertising Ralph Vincent will be chairman again, with assistance being given by Dewey Akers.

Blooms To Be Given Again

It was pointed out at the meeting Tuesday that an average of 1000 out-of-state cars come thru here daily. If blossoms were again given out, a more personal advertising could be had at practically no cost except time. All blossoms given out, it was told, creates a desire to purchase a lily, thus enhancing the industry of lily growing and the future economy of this area.
