

Charges Will Be Made For Forest Camp Privileges

Twelve of the more than 1100 national forest camp grounds in Oregon and Washington will be placed on a charge basis this summer, according to an announcement just made by regional forester H. J. Andrews, U. S. forest service, Portland. Two of these camp grounds, in southern Oregon, went on the charge basis during Memorial week-end while others will start late in June or early July.

This action is following thru with the policy announced last January when it was stated that charges would be made for use of certain national forest camp grounds. The decision to make these charges on an experimental basis was prompted, according to the forest service, by repeated suggestions made by congress that recreational use should bring in some revenue to offset in part the cost of constructing, maintaining and administering forest recreational facilities. Areas at which charges will be made are:

Oregon National Forests: Mt. Hood; Rogue River; Siuslaw; Umpqua; Willamette.

Washington National Forests: Columbia; Snoqualmie.

Forest Camps: Camp Creek; Tollgate; McKee Bridge; Dead Indian Soda Springs; Eel Creek; Siltcoos; Wolf Creek; Clear Lake; Paradise.

Government Mineral Springs: American River; Naches.

Operation of some of these camps will be by permittees who will be allowed to collect fees for the use of the facilities in return for providing their services in keeping the areas clean, dis-

posing of garbage, maintaining the improvements, and furnishing firewood. At least four charge areas will be operated by forest service attendants, who will provide the same standards of maintenance and services as at permittee-operated areas. Charges for the use of the selected camp-grounds will be:

Camping: 50c per night or \$3 per week per car party or not more than 6 adults.

Picnicking: 25c per day per car party of not more than 6 adults. No charge will be made for children under 12 for either camping or picnicking.
