

Conservation Of Game Is Matter Of Education Rather Than Enforcement, California Game Warden Explains

"I would prefer to think of fish and game law enforcement in terms of salesmanship rather than persecution," said Jack McKeller, of Crescent City, game warden for California, in a message to Brookings Rotary club, Tuesday noon.

"I would prefer to have people come to me, man to man, to ask about the laws, about violations, than to have to chase them all over the country for any violation they may have made. It is more fun to appeal to a person's sportsmanship than to see him hauled up in court.

"Relaxation is good for people and so many derive relaxation in going fishing, hunting or camping in our forests or up our streams. People should feel a pride in being able to enjoy these—properly.

"The future of fishing in our times is a matter of battle be-

tween big money and common people. Electrical companies sell the public a bill of goods to effect dam construction on a river, make no or little provision for migration of fish. In time this results in reduction of fishing, in that country.

"If the game division had anything to say, any company out to build a dam would be required to spend adequate fish ladders to not seriously impede the progress upstream of fish during spawning season.

"Results eventually must come from the average citizens, by, and through organization, getting together in sufficient strength to see that fish do not have to be barred from streams just because a dam may cross the stream."
