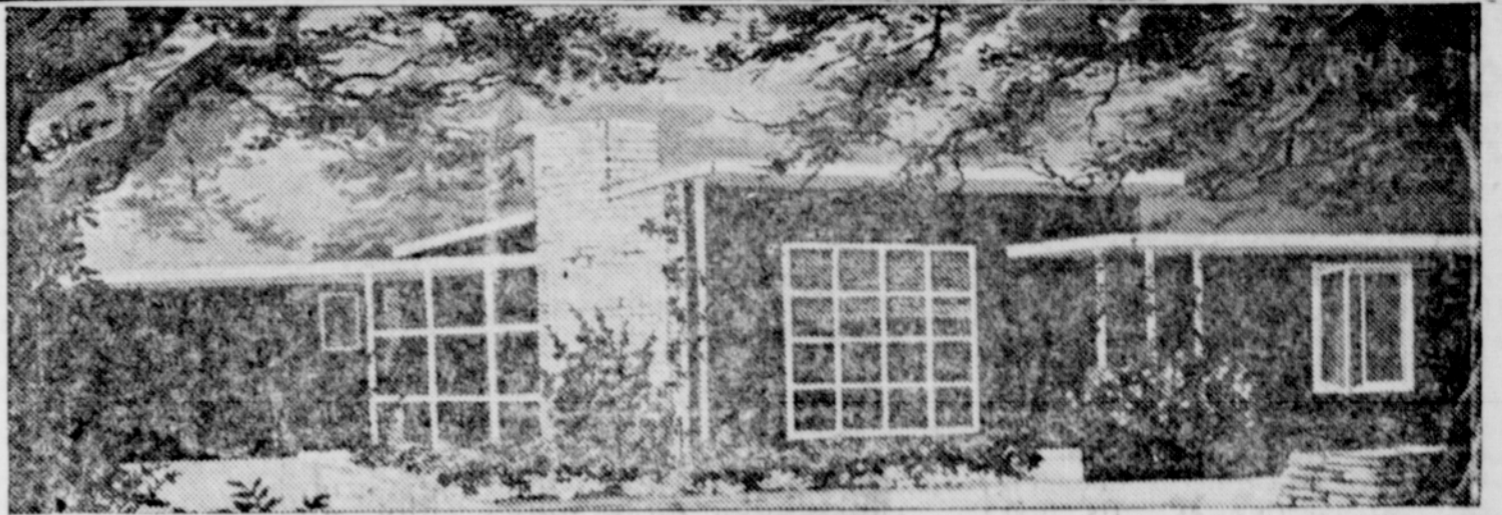

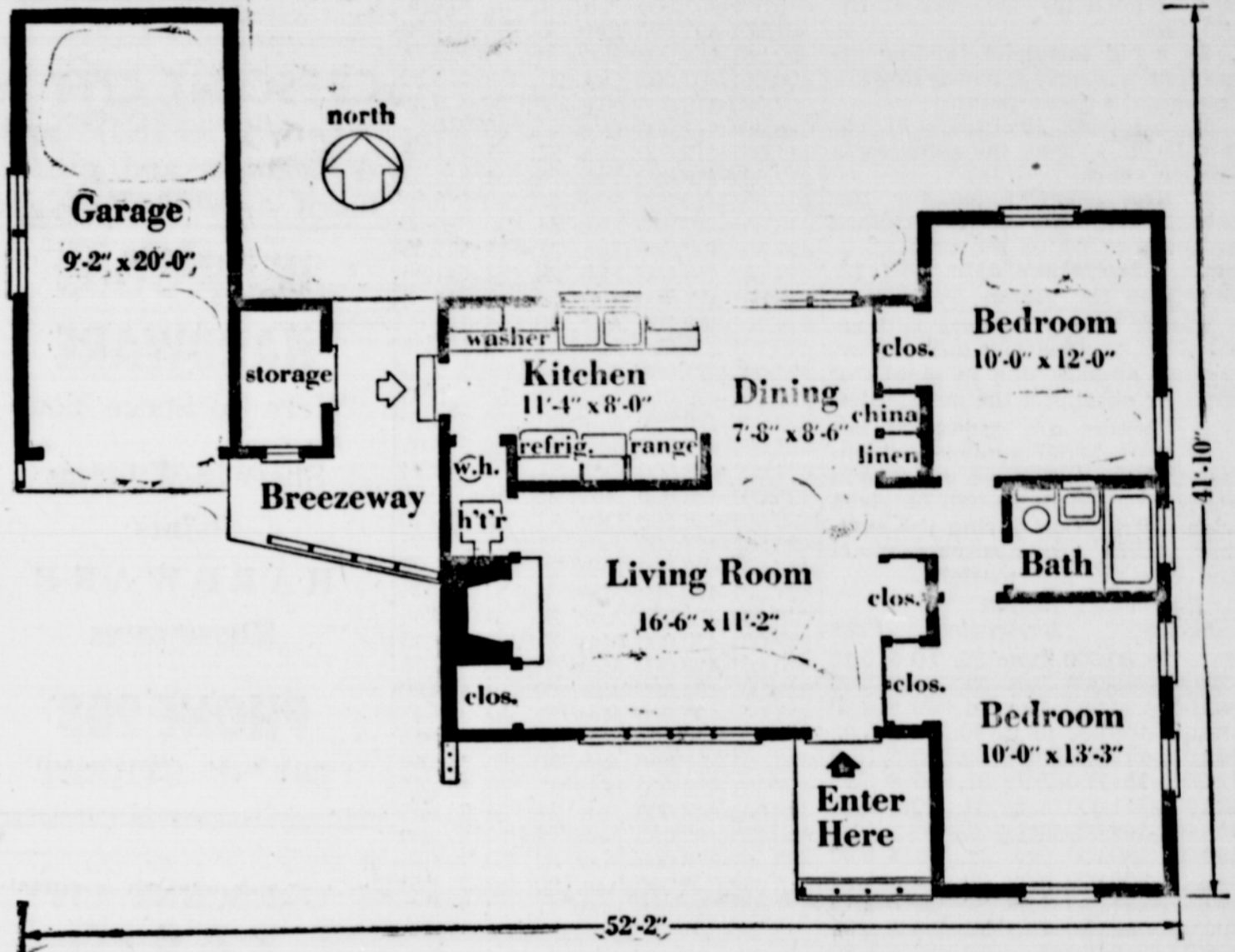
The sermon subject for Sunday morning will be "A Day of Opportunity."
