

# PELICANS SWAMP MERLIN, 20 TO 1, IN SUNDAY GAME

## Westbrook Pitches 5-Hit Ball In Game At Local H. S. Grounds

Merlin, the team which forced Brookings 13 innings to beat, the Sunday before at Merlin, proved to be just another team last Sunday, when the Pelicans hit the ball at will to win handily, 20-1. Hank Westbrook, of Smith River, on the mound for Brookings, allowed few hits, none of which had any potency for score-making.

Neil Nelson, whose batting average for the first half of the season, did himself proud, Sunday, by leading Brookings attack by hitting three home runs. However, Neil was first man up each inning he made these mighty smashes, but they were still sufficient to win the game.

Westbrook, on the mound for the Pelicans, was backed up by sparkling fielding, and had little trouble with Merlin, except in the seventh inning, when a walk, a fielders choice, and an error, and an infield out accounted for the lone Merlin run without benefit of a hit.

Brookings started off in the first with two walks, three hits accounted for three runs. Nelson hit his first home run in the second inning. Up again in the fifth Nelson duplicated his feat, and again in the seventh.

Merlin, on the other hand, allowed what would ordinarily have been singles, if even that, to be two- and three-base bingles for Brookings. At that they turned in two double plays.

In the first inning, after the first man had hit, safely, a walk to the second, Matson picked up a fast grounder, tossed to Spangler who relayed to Ackley for the first double play for the Pelicans.

In the second inning Ackley snagged a fast grounder, heaved to Matson and Matson completed the double play by return to Ackley.

Matson-to-Spangler-to-Ackley combination functioned again in the eighth to save Westbrook any

## Co-op Drops Plans Of Gold Beach Power Line

COQUILLE. (Special to the Pilot) — Coos-Curry Electric Co-operative, June 18, cancelled all plans for construction of a 69 KV transmission line from Gold Beach to Brookings which was to have been let for bid on July 19 to obtain Bonneville power to this area.

In announcing the cancellation, President Ivan C. Laird stated that \$28,000 had already been spent in clearing right-of-way on of the line for which free easements had been obtained, but the 34-mile project over the 95% difficulties encountered in obtaining easements from the balance of the property owners which are acceptable to REA under rules prescribed by Congress made this action necessary. He expressed regret that the contemplated reduction of rates and improved service had been lost to the Gold Beach and stated that the manager had been instructed to look into the feasibility of getting diesel power.

Mr. Laird stated that some easements were unacceptable because it was found that no insurance company would insure against the risks insisted on by the owners, that others gave free easements conditioned upon a 6000-mile plane flight for an entire family to look at the path to be cleared, and other unusual requests for which Congress made no provision.

The text of the resolution: "Resolved that the Manager be and he hereby is directed to stop all further work on the Gold Beach-Brookings transmission line at once, to stop all preparations for the contemplated letting of bids on July 19 for construction of the transmission line, and to terminate all contracts and negotiations involving further expense to the co-operative; and resolved further that the manager investigate the cost and feasibility, and effect on rate structure, of adding diesel capacity in the Gold Beach area."

Other action taken by board of directors at the June 18 meeting included approval of remodeling plans for the new headquarters building in Coquille.

## Abbotts Buy Depot At Livermore, To Be Near Hospital

T. S. Abbott, former Greyhound agent here, and Mrs. Abbott, are moving from Crescent City to Livermore, Calif., to take over the bus depot at that place, Mr. Abbott told the Pilot, Monday.

To enter the veterans hospital there July 1, for treatment of an ailing kidney, Mr. Abbott may be confined to the hospital many months before he can hope to be cured. The move to Livermore is so that Mrs. Abbott may be near to Mr. Abbott during his hospital care.

Bothered many years with ailing kidneys, Mr. Abbott had one removed seven years ago by the Mayo Clinic. Last winter he returned to that place for another

check-up, and found he must be given hospital treatment.

The Abbotts came upon the depot at Livermore quite by accident, when Mr. Abbott learned that it was for sale by the present agent. Carolyn Kerr is there at present, looking after affairs until the Abbotts dispose of the Crescent City office.

Monday, Mr. Abbott was here to close up a few business details before leaving for the south. The moving will take place as soon as new agents are acquainted in Crescent City.
