north to Camp Cleawox, I had occasion to stop at a wayside stand for a little refreshments for the inner man. During the mealtime, it came out we were from Brookings area — immediately I was told by this restaurant man that he had seen the 1948 Lily parade, and had enjoyed it as much as he had any Portland Rose parades.

That put me to thinking about the possibilities of this area in that direction. This area has received pages and pages of publicity because of its lilies—all of it good—in the past. This same type of publicity would continue if this community would only become solid in a movement to see that the lily parades become bigger and better each year.

At Camp Cleawox, two Brookings girls called to the attention of the directors of camp that they had come a long way to attend this camp. The camp director is aware that this area is the home of flowers—leave it to the girls to do this advertising, although neither was conscious of the fact she had done it.

This proposed lily committee has an innovation I certainly do like. Instead of having representatives of each organization, it has been proposed that different types of industry furnish the representatives. This would mean, under the new plan, three from the lily growers, three from the lumber industry and three from business.

Movement is well under way locally to establish a permanent "Lily Blossom Time" committee, comparable to Rosarians at Portland, Berrians at Newberg and Cherrians at Salem. That talk denotes a definite trend toward progress, if I see things clearly.

The aforementioned cities are identified mostly by these events which have become nation-wide in popularity and drawing power. A similar affair can easily be staged here each year along the same plan of action—the best way to make the world conscious of the attractions of southwestern Oregon and especially Curry county. Last Saturday, while en route

This committee, under the proposal, would organize like this: One representative from each type of business to be elected for three year, three for two years and three for one year. From this committee of nine would be picked officers and heads of all committees. A definite plan would be drawn up and the public fully acquainted with its provisions.

From this point, it seems to me, progress could begin, and go forward like it has failed to do in each of our past three attempts which have given us publicity of the best type. It seems, too, that this area is due for more nationwide publicity in less than five years, if the plan works out.

When the call goes out for people to come out for organization of the permanent committee, I'd like very much to see at least 50 present, from which group a real committee may be set up. Early organization would permit the committee to lay the ground work early, to have ample financing to carry on the 1950 parade and not have to solicit money from anyone.

Good patterns for this organization may be found in at least six or more groups sponsoring similar parades in Oregon. To be a member of their groups is an honor in each of these communities—could be the same here.
