

Pelicans Slug Gold Beach, Sunday, By 21 to 5 Shellacking

Gold Beach's hope to even the count in baseball, Sunday, melted in the tropical heat of the day, when the Pelicans hit at will and ran across 21 runs to down the county seat lads, 21 to 5, in what has been a regular affair for the victory-hungry Pelicans.

The win, Sunday, makes ten for the Pelicans this year, against a lone defeat.

The Pelicans scored in every inning but the fourth, the big inning being the sixth when seven tallies crossed the plate. Whitey Matson again led the home team at bat, coming through with five hits in seven trips, two of which were doubles and one a triple. He also gave a fine exhibition of the way short-stopping should be done, getting two putouts and handling six difficult assists in flawless fashion.

Hank Westbrook, winning his fourth game in as many starts, allowed only one scratch infield hit in the first five innings.

Gold Beach then scored four times in the sixth without getting the ball out of the infield. In this frame, the first three batters hit slow infield rollers which went for hits. The first Gold Beach run then scored on a bunt which Ackley mishandled for an error.

The second run scored on a wild pitch by Westbrook and an error by Desjardin on a throw to the plate.

The other two runs score on infield outs. It was only in the ninth that Gold Beach got a hit beyond the infield. E. Fendrick singled to right, was forced at second by Curry who then took second on a passed ball and was scored on a single to center by Asher.

Ex-Nat'l Head To Head Legion Dept. Convention, Salem

SALEM — Keynoting the 1949 convention of the American Legion here August 3 to 6, will be Frank N. Belegano Jr., president of the First National Bank of Portland and past national commander of the Legion, convention officials announced Monday.

Belgrano will open the first business session of the delegates following memorial services on Thursday morning at Salem's Elsinore theatre. Succeeding business meetings are scheduled for the house of representatives in the capitol building.

A native of San Francisco, Belgrano has been associated with the banking business since boyhood, starting as a messenger in his father's bank. He has held

executive positions with various financial and insurance concerns, and prior to accepting the presidency of the Portland institution and its branches in 1947, was president of the Central Bank of Oakland. Since making his home in Oregon he has been in wide demand as a speaker and is prominent in civic affairs.

He enlisted in the army as a private in 1917, advancing to second lieutenant in 1918. His service as national commander, highest office in the American Legion, was in 1934-35.
