period, and carry 2% interest. The co-operative received approval of its new \$165,000 loan only after REA had completed a very thorough study of the application. This study indicated that the co-operative will have adequate revenue from consumers' power bills to meet operating expenses and repay, with interest, all money borrowed from REA for its rural power facilities," Mr. Laird concluded. "Rates charged consumers by the co-operative are based on the actual cost of service."

Since the Coos-Curry Electric Co-operative was organized in June, 1939, it now has received \$2,669,000 in loan fund allocations from REA.

Brookings Water Company Makes Line Extension

The construction crew of the Brookings Water Company has started, this week, to lay 5700 ft. of 8-inch and 6-inch non-corrosive transite pipe, to afford a new supply line from the re-constructed Ferry Creek reservoir.

Work is also being pushed on the 12,000,000-gallon reservoir equipped with clean-out facilities. Settling tanks will be established along the main supply line to relieve the water of any sediment, especially following a rain.

This additional water supply, provided by this reservoir, should insure adequate water during any emergency, Mr. Bankus told the Pilot.
